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PREFACE

The University of Lucknow is an institution shaping Indian education since the pre independence era. The University has manifested diverse educational streams and has catered to India's needs and requirements for nearly 93 years. The mission of the University is, to be a University driven by values enriched with diverse cultures, to promote economic, social and spiritual advancement for an egalitarian society. It has a vision, to develop human resource for furtherance of knowledge through teaching, research and innovation and ranked amongst the top educational institutions of the world for the better service to the humanity in general and our nation in particular.

The students of university of Lucknow, those have shined on India's zenith include names like Dr. Shankar Dayal Sharma- former President of India, Surjit Singh Barnala- Governor of Tamil Nadu, Syed Sibtey Razi -Governor of Jharkhand, K.C. Pant- former Union Minister and Dy Chairman Planning Commission, Prof. Ahmed Ali English novelist, Urdu short story writer, C.M. Naim- writer and academic, Kavi Pradeep, noted poet and lyricist, Swami Chinmayananda- founder of Chinmaya Mission and Vinod Mehta- journalist. This galaxy of students is just to name a few amongst many. Today many of its students are serving for India's scientific innovations, social causes, political agendas, academic institutions and corporate to steer India and humanity as whole in this era of globalization.

The University has students and teachers hailing from diverse backgrounds and academic streams which give the University a distinct and cosmopolitan structure. The 43 departments and allied institution give the University a genuine stature for providing universal education under one roof. The institution has deep cultural roots and pervading atmosphere of respect to each other and this gives it a real democratic standing.

The University is an innovative institution and has embedded practices to capture innovation through its pedagogy. The University initiates new courses in demand with the times. The University also develops new academic relationships with academic institutions within India and outside the country. The University has made organic growth by introducing new courses as well as expansion through new colleges. Today the University has nearly 122 associations as affiliated and autonomous colleges.

The University has impeccably chosen the processes to put the systems in place. Development of new systems has to undergo a pre designed system of a given set of committees and bodies to approve various processes ensuring quality delivery and compliance of regulatory mechanisms. The University is highly responsive to the needs of the scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, other backward casts, minorities and differently able students and gives due recognition to their needs through various extension activities and infrastructural development.

Executive Summary

The University of Lucknow has been a premier institute with its Motto "Light and Learning". The mission of the University is, to be a University driven by values enriched with diverse cultures, to promote economic, social and spiritual advancement for an egalitarian society. It has a vision, to develop human resource for furtherance of knowledge through teaching, research and innovation and ranked amongst the top educational institutions of the world for the better service to the humanity in general and our nation in particular.

Ever since its inception in 1921 the institution has been global in nature and established departments of various Sciences and languages in vogue in different parts of the globe. Among the first departments in the University of Lucknow were, Departments of Oriental Studies in Persian and Oriental Studies in Sanskrit. The University gained stature by adding newer areas of study over time, and today it has 43 departments, 10 institutes, Lucknow University Athletic Association (as a separate body for sports activities), 5 Delegacy Centers (to look into the coo curricular Activities of the students in the city) and 16 hostels (5 for girls and 11 for boys). The University serves through two campuses within the city.

The summary of the report is hear by presented under the seven points, as detailed in the main report.

The University of Lucknow is a progressive University and is sensitive towards the global and regional needs. These issues are reflected in the choice of areas of study and curriculum design & development. Curriculum is an integral part of developing courses; the courses of the University are designed and developed through a strong interactive model where stakeholders are involved in the process of developing curriculum. The University endeavors to create curriculums that are in tune with the needs of the markets. The curriculum development process takes place at two levels a) one at the level of developing a new course and b) secondly during improving the existing curriculums.

Curricular Aspects

The University follows a well defined method of curriculum development. The University takes in to consideration the various stakeholders involved in receiving and imparting education as well as the society at large. The University interacts with the industry and the stakeholders in the working environment to assess the requirements of specialized courses. The courses take into consideration the inputs and are developed accordingly. The courses are updated on the same inputs. Curriculum development process is facilitated in addition along the guidelines of regulatory bodies like, UGC /AICTE/ DBT and other. The UGC Model Curriculums etc are also considered at the time of developing curriculum.


The change in the curriculum is initiated from the environmental inputs which assure that the curriculum is based on market demand. The various

stakeholders that the University involves are executives from the government, non government organizations, private sector, businessmen, social activists, alumni, students as well as from courses instituted in other educational institutions.

The curriculum design has a strong research bent and has instituted research activities at various levels. Conferences, workshops, special lectures, involvement of faculty in special projects, consultancy and assignments are the mediums of interaction with various sections of the society and stakeholders. Such meetings are also used for indirect interaction to understand the needs of the industry and reflect them in the curriculum.

The University has a provision for allowing add-on need based courses in affiliated colleges. The University has always encouraged skill oriented programmes and is offering diverse courses to students.

The University has a mandate and philosophy of enriching the curriculum continuously. Revision and up gradation of syllabus is a continuous exercise in the University. The syllabus is made socially relevant, job oriented and is aimed at holistic vision of the course. Course of most of the subjects have been revised in last four years at Masters and Bachelors level. The value-added courses offered by the University are aimed at overall development of student's skills. At the level of the University, the courses could be developed in two ways, firstly either on the basis of direct intervention from the top or vice versa. The process of adopting a course is shown in the following diagram.



The courses have been designed to deliver a holistic view and develop market mapping traits.

A College Development Council has been formed for the purpose of interacting with the colleges. There is a continuous feedback from the colleges through a representation of the faculty in various academic bodies like the Board of Studies and in Departmental Committees. This democratic setup allows the development of model courses and curriculum.

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The University has been using the latest technology to make the admission process online and the students can make their applications and check admission notification online.

All notifications are advertised on the website of the University and a few selected newspapers as well as on the notice boards of the University. The University clearly indicates the respective department, the number of seats available in each of the courses, their fee structures, their course syllabus, duration of the courses, the respective faculty to teach the courses. Over and above this, the University clearly states the various facilities available in the University to make the aspirant aware before taking admission.

The affiliated colleges admit students of their own either on merit basis or through an open entrance examination. The University ensures the transparency in the admission process, it also ensures that the colleges do not admit student over and above the sanctioned capacity.

The University provides reservation of seats as per the government policy to the SC, STs and OBCs. Players of National repute who are at the first, second or third positions at the national level will get direct admission in the University. The University has a policy of weightage reservation for the persons with varied disabilities.

The University has a policy of running only those self finance courses which are viable and have a demand ratio of at least 0.4. The University runs remedial coaching for the SC/ST candidates to prepare them for NET/SLET exams and also for the various competitive exams for jobs.

The University has a policy to provide equal opportunity to the students belonging to disadvantageous category and it has an Equal Opportunity Cell functional for this purpose.

The advanced learners are encouraged to attend various activities of academic nature during summer vacations and some of the departments offer summer training to the students for their interaction with industries.

The University drafts an academic calendar, which is declared at the start of the session and is posted on the website. The entire department follows the academic calendar. It is ensured that norms of all the statutory bodies are well complied with.

The University has a well defined system of examinations. Appropriate panels for paper setters/examiners for the semester/annual examination are considered by the Board of Studies of respective subjects and approved by

Academic Council. The University ensures that the entire syllabus is available on the website.

The University has a policy of inviting faculty from national and international organizations. The University has decentralized the process of inviting professionals. The University has tried to make a number of classrooms having internet connectivity.

Some of the departments in the University have counselor/ mentors/ advisors appointed for the students. The University has ventured into creating model class rooms having OHP, LCD, Case Method of teaching, Industrial Visits, Webinars, Seminars, Role Play, Presentation, City Visits, Educational Tours, on the job trainings, field works and many more things are regular features of the teaching in the University..

"Sanskritiki" (a body responsible for the cultural activities) is a vibrant body which takes care of extracurricular activities of students. It has many clubs which regularly organize different cultural and academic fest throughout the year.

The University is in the process of developing a e-learning portal that will enhance e-learning capabilities among the teachers. The University has one Academic staff college which regularly organize orientation, refresher, short term skill development programmes for the faculty members.

The University advertises the vacant positions regularly in the national daily and also on the University website. The qualification and eligibility conditions are at par with those provided by UGC. The applications received are thoroughly scrutinized and a statutory selection committee appoints the most suitable candidate.

The University encourages its faculty in applying for different scholarships/ fellowships available at national and international level. They are provided study leave/ privilege leave/ duty leave for availing these facilities.

Different departments of the University organize programmes for curriculum development, teaching-learning methods, and examination reforms time to time. These aspects are also discussed in the departmental committee meetings on regular basis.

The University has various schemes of academic development for faculty. With the help of such schemes, the faculty has grown in academic understanding and has adopted new methods of teaching. This has also helped the faculty to understand global competitiveness.

The University has a well designed evaluation process of students. Students and faculty members (of University and affiliated colleges) are well aware of the marks bifurcation for theory and practical exams. Notices regarding any changes in the above mentioned system are well circulated in advance so that the stake holders are well aware in advance. The process of moderation is in practice and all the question papers pass through this process before they are printed and sealed. The paper setters are required to submit a model answer papers before the start of evaluation process in order to maintain uniformity in the evaluation.

There are number of provisions like scrutiny etc. by which students can submit their representation regarding the marks obtained.

Pass marks and grace marks rules have also been made more student-friendly and simpler. The University has provided partial autonomy to departments for paper-setting and evaluation in order to save time in declaration of results. The University results are generally declared within 45 day in the case of UG annual examinations (in UG classes results of all the affiliated colleges are also included). The PG results of semester based examinations are declared in 30 days. The PG examination answer books are coded before evaluation to maintain confidentiality. In the case of UG evaluation, a process of "Random Distribution" of answer books to evaluator is adopted. A panel of examiners are proposed by board of studies of respective departments for evaluation of M. Phil. and Ph. D. thesis, The Vice Chancellor choose two examiners out of this panel to be appointed as examiner for the evaluation of thesis.

The University has created a College Development Council and the council is in the process of bringing in the reforms. As of now, the colleges are given a title in the marksheets of the students. Hence there is always a parity treatment with colleges.

The University has gone in for massive computerization of examinations processes. The day the student enters the University, she/he is allotted a single enrolment number. The examinations system takes into consideration this enrolment number/roll number and process the results accordingly.

University life offers up opportunities to try new ventures for the students. It is offereing lot of activities for the students other than lecture, labs and libraries like LUAA with its two sports fields, NCC, Sanskritiki, Gymnasium, NSS & Students Union.

The board of studies of departments meets regularly to discuss ways and means of assessing student learning. It always guides its faculty members on the design of the question paper. In the professional courses there is a internal assessment weightage of 30%. The internal assessment consists of continuous assessment, internal examination, class participations, project presentation and the likes.

The University's mandate is to serve the students in order to uplift the citizens of its state and in the same, has extended its teaching activities through a number of colleges. The learning outcomes are always kept in mind and the University teaching is aligned in needs of the social environment.

The University has come up with model classrooms. The University is introducing new experiments in Science Streams. It also includes field visits, group discussions, role plays, webinars, seminars, conference participations etc. Moot courts are a regular activity in Law Faculty courses.

Research, Consultancy and Extension

The University has Departmental Research Degree Committees (DRC) in each subject to monitor and promotes research in the respective fields. The Head of Department is Chairperson of the committee. All the professors, two associate professors, two assistant professors and all the concerned supervisors are its members. Some time external members are also invited if required. The affiliated college teachers can collaborate with the labs and other research groups of University and carry on their research work.

Proactive mechanisms adopted by the University to facilitate the smooth implementation of research schemes/projects are, advancing funds for sanctioned projects, providing seed money, simplification of procedures related to sanctions / purchases to be made by the investigators out of project funds and research grants, autonomy granted to the principal investigator/coordinator for utilizing overhead charges, timely release of grants, timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities.

The interdisciplinary research and collaborations with national/international institutes / industries is encouraged by University. Teachers of various departments have freedom to submit research project proposals to various funding agencies, independently and / or in collaboration with their other sister departments. In addition to that the various faculty members of the University are doing collaborative research with almost all the prominent national and international universities/ institutions. The University promotes visit of eminent persons for delivering talks at various occasions and platforms.

Nearly 10% of the total budget is earmarked for research and academic development during the current financial year. Many post doctoral fellows are working in different departments as D S Kothari fellow, Fast track fellows and on other schemes.

The University is having a leased line of 8 mbps bandwidth and almost every department has access to internet through this leased line. The various journals are available in the departments through INFLIBNET scheme of UGC. Nearly all the departments of the science faculty have vibrant research groups with state of the art facilities for experimental work. The University also has a computer cluster as a centralized research facility for high end computing and data analysis.

Numbers of teachers from various teaching departments have received recognition and awards from various national and international bodies, and they are active members of various academic/administrative bodies.

The faculty members of the University are normally involved in the honorary consultancy to the various governments and non government organisation. The Department of business administration has a Industry Institute partnership cell and the University has also formulated a industry consultancy cell to create a better liaison with the industry.

The University departments receive funds in the form of project to provide free consultancy to the various sections of the community. The various departments and IQAC of the University organize lectures and other activities on the days like AIDS awareness day, Earth Day, Anti tobacco day, science day etc to disseminate information and sensitize the students and faculty members on the issues of global and national importance.

The University promotes the neighbourhood network through its full-fledge NCC & NSS offices. The University promotes the participation of students in the activities of national & international importance by circulating the information related to these activity on the website and departmental notice boards. The NSS coordinator and NCC officers of the University keep a record and track of students active in the social activities. Besides delivering subject

knowledge for their career development, the University promotes the inculcation of moral and social values in the students to develop them as good human being and responsible citizens.

The University contribution in the social and community service is well reflected in the activities like Blood Donation, Tree Plantation, Environment Day rally, AIDS Awareness Day Rally, National Literacy Day- Poster Competition & Slogan Writing, Sanitation Campaign, Cornea Donation Awareness Camp, Gomati River Cleaning, Cycle Rally to mark special days, formation of human chain etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The University has fully functional planning and development board. This board goes through all the demands and requirement proposed by the different departments of the University.

University is in the process of constant and consistent development of its infrastructure; recently University has constructed 50 model class rooms with the funding from state government. These multimedia equipped class rooms are helping the faculty to use modern techniques of pedagogy.

Entrance of all the buildings in the University has ramps to address the special needs of physically challenged persons. It also has separate toilets (for girls and boys) on ground floor of the campus with ramp entrances.

University has 11boys hostel and 5 girls hostel in the campus. All the hostels have entertainment facility like T.V. in common rooms .They have subscription of newspapers and magazine and have a small library cum reading rooms.

The University has a full functional dispensary with resident doctors and paramedic staff in the campus. There has a budget allocation of rupees 50, 00,000 for this purpose.

Lucknow University Athletic Association (LUAA) is a central body responsible for the sports related activities in the campus .The University has cricket ,Hockey, Football, T.T. ,Basket ball ,base ball ,tennis ,soft ball ,athletics etc. clubs under LUAA for promoting sport activities among the student . Sanskritiki is the institution in the University which caters to the cultural activity needs of students.

The central library of the University is a happening place in the campus. It is headed by honorary librarian. The committee of the deans is on advisory board of the library. The committee asks for the requirement from department and they in turn circulate this information amongst faculty, this ensures a complete democratic process of the purchasing of books.

University has constituted an IT task force, a centralized committee to look into various aspects and dimension of IT related activities. This task force is an apex body which looks after the immediate needs and future expansion plans of the institutions.

This task force is responsible for purchases of various hardware, software, their copy right and licensing issues, resource sharing and e-waste management. This taskforce is also responsible for the future up gradation of networking and office automation issues.


The University has invested heavily on building on computer infrastructure. All the offices and department have LAN connectivity and have latest desktop and printers. There are around one fifty computer are used in offices and around six hundred systems are in use by students. Around 850 nodes are available on LAN, V.C. office and residence has Wi-Fi facility.

The University is in the process of building of e-learning portal. The University has constructed 50 model class rooms in the different departments for the purpose of teaching with new techniques. Computers, printers and internet with LAN connection are available to all the faculty members. They also purchase different supplementary software's according to their research need from the funds generated by them. The University has connectivity provided through the National Knowledge Network. All the resources those are free or are through Inflibnet, are available on University network.

Student Support and Progression

The University has a system to support and mentor the students on the campus through some of the statutory bodies like Lucknow University Athletic Association, Sanskritiki, Delegacy centers etc. The University develops various schemes for the welfare of the students undertaken by the Dean, Students Welfare. The University provides ample opportunities for the students to develop and grow in their academic and other related fields in addition to the class room teaching. The various departments/institutes frequently organize national and international level seminars/ workshops and conferences where the students get opportunities to interact with experts in their respective fields, as also with their seniors in the subject.


All The department running professional courses have their own career counseling and placement cells. These cells organize career fests regularly. The University is planning to bring in an International Student Cell specifically catering special need of the foreign students.

The University has a fully functional equal opportunity cell to provide the special thrust and focused attention towards the issues concerning SC, ST, OBC, Women and Physically Challenged. It has a mandate "Equitable access to quality

higher education is an essential prerequisite for realizing the Constitutional promise of 'Equality of Opportunity' as well as achieving the goal of inclusive development, as outlined in the Twelfth Plan.

The University runs two free coaching centers one for SC/ ST candidates and one for Minority community students, appearing for Civil Services, Defense Services, NET/SET etc.

The University publishes its annual report regularly. This report includes all the academic and extracurricular activities undertaken by the faculty and students.

The University has a registered Alumni Association which meets time to time and also helps in arranging lectures of eminent scholars at the time of convocation weak and other events.

The University has a grievance redressal cell. The University promotes a gender-sensitive environment by conducting gender related programmes in the institute of women studies regularly. The members are drawn from all the levels in teaching community, there is also a representation of various external members by election, nomination as well as representation from disadvantageous classes.

The University gives utmost care and attention to encourage the women students to participate in sports.

The UG, PG, diploma and various certificate courses in the University are of fixed duration. Almost 90% students complete theses courses in stipulated time. In the case of Ph. D. course the minimum time limit is specified but most of the time the course is completed in 4-5 years (80% cases). Only 10% students are able to complete it in minimum time limit.

The 95% of the PG students appear for the UGC, NET/CSIR- NET, SLET and GATE examination. The pass percentage of these examinations is roughly 5%. Almost 60% of the UG students appear for CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT and other competitive exams.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The executive council of the University (The apex decision making body) has a diverse representation this includes, business representatives, judiciary representatives, academicians, Chancellor's Nominee and any other stakeholder representative as deemed important.

The Executive Council is sensitive towards the cultural and cross cultural issues and always tries to draw guidelines to develop a culture of excellence in academics and administration as well as.

The University has a policy of rotation of positions in various bodies. This ensures participative leadership. All the statutory bodies like Departmental committees, Faculty Boards, Academic Council and Executive Councils are truly democratic in nature and the membership is rotatory in nature.

Departments have a democratic setup for knowledge management. The departmental committees have a statutory representation of the college academicians as well.

The departments have their own departmental research committees which take care of research at various levels. The trained manpower from the University serves the globe in varied ways.

The students of the University contribute in varied fields in the society, like, literary, academic, social, political, managerial, scientific and business areas of human activity.


The University ensures that it involves itself with various global institutions through various kinds of alliances, associations and collaborations.

The University is always trying to bring in new technologies and is marching ahead with its vision –"Strive to cultivate the human resource for furtherance of knowledge through innovation, research and teaching and to be amongst the top 100 education providers of the world for better service to the human kind". It has a mission- "To be a University driven by values of diverse cultures to foster social, economic and spiritual mobility for a just and equitable society".

The University has a policy to ensure quality in accordance with UGC guidelines. It has a full functional internal quality and assurance cell. The IQAC operates with a full functional boards headed by a director and nominated members.

The teachers are financially assisted through grants for attending workshops, conference and seminars within and outside India. The faculty members submit their self appraisal and employee's confidential report is submitted by their departmental heads, these are annual exercises.

The University is offering sixth pay commission for payment as salaries to its employees. The University provides academic leave to have proper up-gradation of academic standards for a better academic life. Gender ratio statistics for students and teachers are annually collected in the University. The computerized system of computing has been designed to get such statistics. The University has 51.78% boys and 48.22% girls with a faculty representing 33% females and 67% males.

The University has been mobilizing resources from various sources. The University gets its income from the fee of regular course and self finance courses. The University also gets is grant from the State government.

The University is very conscious about the environment and has trained its botanical personnel about environmental issues. The University is going to have a Green Audit conducted every three years. The University takes into consideration natural lighting and this ensures saving of electricity. The University ensures that most of the ground space is kept open and is not cemented, this ensures rain water harvesting. The University has restricted the movement of automobiles in campus.

Innovations

The University has got its leased line commissioned through National Knowledge Network for providing internet facility to the campus. The departments and other offices in both the campuses are connected through internet facility.

The University has joined the INFLIBNET. Through this facility the University is able to provide number of journals to the research scholars and faculty members in their laboratories/ chambers directly for their academic activities. The central library of the University also houses a facility of 50 nodes for the user to get access of e resources available.

The University displays its various notices on its website. The details of all the faculty, results of every course, admission notifications, registration, administrative rules & regulations are also posted on the website.

All the hostels of the University have the internet facilities for the students.

The University has all the information about the Masters and Bachelors programmes in two separate brochures, these brouchers are available on the University website. These have all the details about the various courses. The brochure has the number of seats and fee details. The ordinances regarding UG and PG admission are also available online.

From the current academic session, University has adopted new online system of admission for all the UG, PG course and this has lead to a hassle free

transparent admission process. The University has been able to reduce the expenditure incurred and involvement of human resource for this process.

The library of the University is partially computerized and more than 50 nodes are available for the users to access e resources.

The University has a virtual classroom video conferencing and a studio facility in ASC for remote lecture delivery, discussions on subjects of common Interest, interviews, etc.

The NCC and NSS wings of the University have been vibrantly active in past years and have organized number of activities for the complete development of the students.

Sanskritiki, the body responsible for the cultural activities and extracurricular activities of the students has made its base broad by integrating various activity clubs in it. Many faculty members particularly female teachers are now involved in organization of events. This has ensured the larger participation of girl students.

Lucknow University Athletic Association (LUAA) is a vibrant body which has number of clubs for different sports and a ladies club headed by female faculty member specially to encourage female student participation in the sports.

The library of the University organizes book fairs for the faculty members and students of the University. The University also facilitates the organization of national book fair in the campus by providing space and other infrastructure facility.

The University also organize exhibition of research publication and books published by the faculty members of the University during convocation weak.

The grievance boxes are available at Dean offices and other places to facilitate students to lodge their grievances without disclosing their identity.

The greater element of autonomy given to the departments in their working has resulted in timely evaluation and declaration of examination results and has improved student's satisfaction.

The University of Lucknow is adopting many best practices; few of them can be enumerated as follows-

Transparent Academic processes (Admission, result declaration etc) through Information & Communication Technology (ICT)-

The University has used ICT for making admission and examination system efficient and transparent. ICT is also used to augment learning resources for advancement of learning, teaching, and research. The use of ICT has also resulted in enhancing administrative efficiency and transparency.

Participative Curriculum Development System-

The curriculum of any University is the best reflection of its academic strength. It has to be upgraded constantly and the components related to the applicability of knowledge on actual basis must be incorporated into it. It is only possible by the interactive participation of the various stakeholders. The University of Lucknow has a complete democratic setup in its various committees responsible for this job and this particular practice of participatory development of curriculum has been very successful in evolving the syllabus of all the streams and keeps the University at par with the other top academic institutions.

Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC)

The University of Lucknow is one of the oldest universities in the northern Part of the country. During the passage of time the University has established its Brand as a Centre of Excellence in Learning and Research. The institution is marching ahead with its vision to cultivate human resource for expanding knowledge through innovation, research and teaching for better service to the human kind. The greatest strength of the University is its highly motivated and research oriented facility. The extra mural grants of the University are around Rs. 4,00,00,000. There is an annual addition of around 400 research projects. The motivated faculty publishes more than 500 research papers annually in peer reviewed journals of national and international repute. The University is located in the capital city of Uttar Pradesh and is capable of attracting faculty and students from culturally diverse backgrounds. This makes the University culture, truly cosmopolitan.

The University is receiving large number of applications from the students seeking admission in its research programmes. The presence of adequate number of research scholars is necessary for the timely completion of ongoing research projects in the University.

Democratic participation in the facilitation of various processes is one of the greatest strengths of this University. This falls in line with the philosophy of our country's democratic stature. Curriculum development is an integral representation of this process. The curriculum development participatory process hence holds its relevance in creating a strong human resource for the country.

The University aligning with its motto of "light and learning" has given strong relevance to Information Technology. The University has developed a state of the art infrastructure for information technology systems. It is noteworthy to state here that the University has shifted its focus from outsourcing to in house development of a number of processes. This year the University has processed its own results, online admission, printing of examination admit cards, student id cards etc. These processes have been developed over a period of time. The next activity in line with in house development is complete office automation throughout the University Departments. The University has created an IT Taskforce, an apex body to look into technology related issues for development and implementation.

The University is very strong in its diverse nature of academic streams and has over 43 educational departments, few additional courses are also being offered by some colleges.

The University has a strong residential facility with 16 hostels for the students and residences for its teaching and non teaching community.

The University is well located in two campuses and has used them well; the students are given an opportunity to excel themselves in sports, co curricular and cultural activities. The University has two very well developed arms the National Cadet Core and Nationals Service Scheme. Students participated extensively in the activities organized by these arms and they participate in social and developmental activities of the country.

The University of Lucknow is a state University governed by U.P. State Universities Act - 1973 (amended and updated). The State Government has a strong role to play in the development and decision making of the University. The grants received from the Government are very meager and this has resulted in slowing down of its developmental activities.

The University of Lucknow despite being one of the longest serving University in the Country has not been given proper grants in the recent past due to lack in transparency in awarding funds. There are newer educational establishments / universities which have been sanctioned huge sums of money whereas this University is treated unequally. This is one of the greatest weakness of this University.

Many a times the state government gives grants with appointment of some agency for the commissioning of tasks. This recent activity has adversely affected the quality of the work undertaken by other agencies, as in most of the cases these agencies are not professionally managed and have very little experience for technically skilled jobs. The University image has also taken a beating in the recent past due to the non performance of such agencies.

The University was sanctioned a number of posts in various plan proposals from time to time by central funding agencies. Invariably these new posts lapsed, because the University is unable to get concurrence from the state government for the financial implications of these posts after the expiry of the plan period, which happens to be five years. This has hampered the growth as University is not able to widen its faculty base in numbers.

The University depends on state government for approval and implementation of various regulations as pronounced by different central regulatory bodies. There has always been a time lag in implementation of such schemes and regulations, this in turn causes delay in the release of grants and thus hampers growth.

The first campus of the University has many buildings more than 75 years old. They need regular maintenance but the University gets small funds for maintenance. The University also has to manage a large data and electrical network, a computer and DTP section but it is also deficient in funds for maintaining these facilities. This is a serious policy issue as it is always easy to get funds for new hardware, but rarely any grants are available for support and maintenance purposes.

The University of Lucknow can presently affiliate colleges from the District of Lucknow only. This seriously limits the Universities expansion and growth.

This era is an era of internationalization. The University looks at it as an opportunity to become a Global University by opening global campuses and using e learning route to cater the needs of various international students.

The University is seeking collaborations from various national and international institutions of repute. The faculties are always advised by their respective boards to extend collaborations and exchange programmes.

The University is in the process of creating state of art centralized Research Park for interdepartmental research. This is a new opportunity for growth of various streams of knowledge in the University.

The University is offering various courses of interdisciplinary nature to enhance the lateral movement of students in order to expand its knowledge base. The University recognizes this as a new opportunity in the process of teaching and learning.

Procurement of new funds is essential for the growth of the institution. The University looks at this as a challenge and is trying hard for this in this competitive era.

The creation of new faculty positions for widening of faculty base is a big challenge for a state run University. The University officials are constantly in touch with government officials and the chancellor's office to address this challenge in a given time frame.

Maintenance of old buildings with small maintenance grant is a real challenge for policy makers and executioners in the University. The works department of the University develops a priority based plan and categorizes maintenance requirements as immediate, urgent and important. It rosters the task in line with the categories and availability of the funds.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development


1.1.1 How is the institutional vision and mission reflected in the academic programmes of the University?

The University mission to be a University driven by value of diverse cultures to rolling social economic and spiritual mobility of students is well reflected in its academic program. Its vision of furtherance of knowledge is always driving it hard to achieve its goals. It has diversity where 43 departments and 10 institutes are actively engaged in furtherance of knowledge and learning.

1.1.2 Does the University follow a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum? If yes, give details of the process (need assessment, feedback, etc.).

The University follows a well defined method of curriculum development. The University takes in to consideration the various stakeholders involved in receiving and imparting education as well as the society at large. The University interacts with the industry and the stakeholders in the working environment to assess the requirements of specialized courses. The courses take into consideration the inputs and are developed accordingly. The courses are updated on the same inputs. The above process is facilitated in addition to regulatory requirements as imposed by UGC and other bodies in the form of UGC Model Curriculums etc.

At the level of the University, the courses could be developed in two ways, firstly either on the basis of direct intervention from the top or vice versa. The process of adopting a course is shown in the following organogram.



1.1.3 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development?

- * Employability: As shown in the organogram above the change in the curriculum is initiated from the environmental inputs which assure that the curriculum is based on market demand. The various stakeholders that are involved executives from the government, non government organizations, private sector, businessmen, social activists, alumni, students as well as representative from courses instituted in other educational institutions. The syllabus of the University Courses are designed keeping in mind examinations like National Eligibility Test of UGC/ CSIR, SLET, JEST, GATE and other competitive examinations. This ensures employability of the students.
- * Innovation: The courses of the University are integrated with the requirement of industry and existing business environment. The students are continuously involved in various forms of programmes and practices on the market place. Students along with teachers understand the latest needs of the employers in this manner. This helps in innovating new areas. Teachers are engaged in continuous innovative programmes.
- Research: The curriculum has a strong research bent and has instituted research activities at various levels. The faculty members of the University are working on different academic and applied problems related to the latest areas of research in all the streams and their research work has received funding from various agencies like DST, UGC, DAE, ISRO, CSIR, DRDO,, ICSSR, AICTE and others. Design of the curriculum takes into account the specialized knowledge of its faculty members and tries to pass this knowledge to its pupil. Various workshops, conferences and seminars are organised from time to time and students are motivated to actively participate in these activities. Initiatives on direct research include courses like Ph.D, D.Litt, LLD etc and at the masters level the students have to develop research based projects which are a part of the curriculum. In essence the curriculum is designed keeping in view the overall employability through latest research.

1.1.4 To what extent does the University use the guidelines of the regulatory bodies for developing and/or restructuring the curricula? Has the University been instrumental in leading any curricular reform which has created a national impact?

The University rigorously follows the guidelines of regulatory authorities like UGC/ AICTE/ DBT etc. The University also takes care of considering the syllabus of National Eligibility Test of UGC/ CSIR, SLET, JEST, GATE and other competitive examinations while upgrading the curriculum of different subjects. Since its inception the University is offering unique courses in Oriental studies in Sanskrit and Oriental studies in Persian which draws attention of international community as well.

1.1.5 Does the University interact with industry, research bodies and the

civil society in the curriculum revision process? If so, how has the University benefitted through interactions with the stakeholders?

Conferences, workshops, special lectures, involvement in special projects, consultancy assignments are the mediums of interacting with various sections of the society and stakeholders. Such meetings are also used for indirect interaction to understand the needs of the industry and reflect them in the curriculum. The University has developed placement bureaus in certain departments and these departments interact with organizations for employment purposes. The University has taken up the task of improving the curriculum responsibly through participation of external experts who give a bird's eye view as an external consultant to bridge any gaps in the curricula.

The University has a strong heritage of academia and many of the academics are members of a good number of academic bodies at the national and international level with representation at University Grants Commission, All India Council of Technical Education, United Nations Bodies and many others. The learning from these research bodies is brought on board and the University benefits from such interactions.

The University is open to a number of forums on the civil society front. It has no barriers of any kind and many forums use the University as a platform for discussions on varied areas like Human Rights, Women Empowerment, Child Protection, Environmental Issues, International Peace and many other civil rights issues. It would not be a misnomer to say that the University is a strong promoter of issues concerning the civil society. These get reflected in the academic activities and curricula of the University.

1.1.6 Give details of how the University facilitates the introduction of new programmes of studies in its affiliated colleges.

The University has a provision for allowing add on need based courses in the affiliated colleges. Such courses are allowed only after undergoing a specific procedure. The procedure is as follows

The concerned college applied to the University about its intention to initiate a course through a Letter of Intention after that the University forms a committee which examines the viability on following aspects related with

- 1. Infrastructure
- 2. Adequate Teaching Staff
- 3. Adequate Supporting Staff

Once the requesting institution fulfils the basic criterion for initiating a course the academic council approves the course and the number of seats. The University has also constituted a College Development Council under supervision of Dean for better interaction with colleges on the recommendation of last NAAC Peer Visiting Team. CDC provides an enabling environment to all the colleges to impart quality education.

1.1.7 Does the University encourage its colleges to provide additional skill-oriented programmes relevant to regional needs? Cite instances (not applicable for unitary universities).

The University has always encouraged skill oriented programmes and has courses of varied nature. It has initiated course on various languages like

Urdu, Persian, Arabic and other which have been the need of the region. Although it is important to mention that the University has its affiliated colleges in an area of about 20 Kms and there is no regional variation in the specific needs of various colleges.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Furnish the inventory for the following:

The University of Lucknow offers various undergraduate, graduate and post graduate, doctoral and post doctoral programmes in the streams of science, arts, commerce, law, fine arts and education. The programmes offered are in accordance with UGC guidelines and statutory provisions of the University. The UG courses of the University are three year programmes in which students choose three subjects for the first two years of the studies and in the third and the final year the students have the choice of a few subjects. The details of various courses are as follows.

The courses in the Masters courses are semester wise. The students have the choice of specializations in most of the courses offered by various departments.

- * Programmes available for colleges to choose from: The University has offered a number of programmes to the colleges mostly at the bachelor's level. Although some colleges which fulfill the norms for Master programmes also offer such programmes.

1.2.2 Give details on the following provisions with reference to academic flexibility

- a. **Core / Elective options**: In most of the Masters programmes the courses have been designed to impart basic grounding on relevant issues in the first and in the final year the students have an option to opt for relevant streams and courses. There are some courses in Bachelors programmes where the students have an option to choose in the final year.
- b. **Enrichment courses**: The University has a number or enrichment courses for various stages. The University has Proficiency course in French. Department of English has developed special modules on communication for the students of allied field and these courses are extended through a language lab.
- c. Courses offered in modular form: Most of the courses are delivered through annual modules.
- d. Credit accumulation and transfer facility: The University has a policy of transfers form one institution to another. There are a number of cases where the transfers have taken place through equivalence committees. When a student applies for a transfer to the University the degree in validated by the equivalence committee of the University and once the degree qualifies the University considers the credentials for admitting the student to

the respective course.

e. Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes, courses and disciplines: The students are permitted interdisciplinary changes at the Masters level under certain specified rules relating to academic performance. A student is free to take admission in any other discipline after completing a course in one as a fresh candidate subject to his her eligibility or merit in the other course. Bachelor's student enjoys freedom to choose two out of three subjects in the final year while in some master's courses they have freedom to choose one specialization out of available specializations.

1.2.3 Does the University have an explicit policy and strategy for attracting international students?

The University has all the programmes open to international students subject to national rules. The University promotes international students through international exchange programmes designed by India and other countries. The University looking at the need of the students has a 70 seat Hostel separately for international students.

1.2.4 Have any courses been developed targeting international students? If so, how successful have they been?

A specialized subject on International Business is designed to impart specific education in International Business to the students of Masters Courses. While designing the courses it is kept in mind that the courses can be imparted to international students hence an international perspective is at the back of all the courses. The University has also developed a Masters In International Business Management programme.

1.2.5 Does the University facilitate dual degree and twinning programmes? If yes, give details.

The University offers LLB 5 Years Dual degree programme.

1.2.6 Does the University offers self-financing programmes? If yes, list them and indicate if policies regarding admission, fee structure, teacher qualification and salary are at par with the aided programmes?

The programmes offered by the University are attached in the Annexure- 2. The University follows all the reservation policies as applicable from time to time. The contractual faculty has been pegged at par with the regular faculty. The entry level qualifications are also pegged at par with regular faculty.

The University has a facility of Virtual Classroom and Studio for interacting with students across the University.

The University promotes inter disciplinary programmes. Some of the programmes like Environment Science, Renewable Energy and Electronic etc are interdisciplinary in nature. The students are very employable and well placed after completing the programmes.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 How often is the curriculum of the University reviewed and upgraded for making it socially relevant and/or job oriented / knowledge intensive and meeting the emerging needs of students and other stakeholders?

Revision and upgrading of syllabus is a continuous exercise in the University courses. The syllabus is made socially relevant and job oriented and is aimed at holistic view of the course. Course of most of the subjects have been revised in last four years at Masters and Bachelors level and these changes take place through the procedure as in organogram in 1.1.2. The University follows a well defined method of curriculum development. The University takes in to consideration the various stakeholders involved in receiving and imparting education as well as the society at large. The University interacts with the industry and the stakeholders in the working environment to assess the requirements of specialized courses. The courses take into consideration the inputs and are developed accordingly. The courses are updated on the same inputs. The above process is facilitated in addition to regulatory requirements as imposed by UGC and other bodies in the form of UGC Model Curriculums etc.

1.3.2 During the last four years, how many new programmes at UG and PG levels were introduced? Give details.

1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for the revision of the existing programmes? What percentage of courses underwent a syllabus revision?

The feedback from different areas is accepted and on the basis of the feedback from the various stakeholders like the society, students, employers, market etc. The courses are revised on the basis of the feedback. All the courses have been revised in the last four years.

1.3.4 What are the value-added courses offered by the University and how does the University ensure that all students have access to them?

The University offers value added courses which are disguised in the

curriculum. The value-added courses offered by the University are aimed at overall development of student's skills. The courses have been designed to deliver a holistic view to the pupil and develop traits mapped to market traits. Various courses on languages like Hindi, English Orientating, Sanskrit Basics and various Foreign Languages are delivered to develop communication (written and verbal) for personality development. The University also participates in community activities at times of need and various programmes like cleaning of Gomti, providing food and clothes to the needy blood donating helping in food affected accurate. The University also arranges programmes of National Cadet Corps which has a special office and premises allocated to it. In the same way we have a fully fledged National Saving Scheme Cell to accomplish various objectives of NSS through the University. Both these cells work as a special arm to provide various activities to the society. The students of the Law Department continuously participate in Mock Parliament.

Various laboratories in the Department of science are highly skilled and state of the art. These laboratories help the students in developing skills of handling instruments and designing specialized projects and also provide the needed training for technical / scientific careers.

Various departments of the University involve the students with case discussions, role plays, simulation, experiential learning, buzz sessions, seminars, exercises, and group discussions as learning methods for students which enhances employability of the students.

1.3.5 Has the University introduced any higher order skill development programmes in consonance with the national requirements as outlined by the National Skills Development Corporation and other agencies?

The University lays an overall emphasis on higher order skill development and every department in the University tries to do it uniquely. The University involves students in programmes with varied contents and activities encouraging students to participate in a variety of co-curricular and social activities. Students engage in brain-storming, role-plays, quizzes, budget analysis, panel discussions, conference and seminar paper presentations, management games, dumb charades and mock drills. The students also participate continuously in various cultural programmes. The University goes ahead with such event all around the year. Sanskritiki is a special cell created to coordinate and conduct the activities of the University.

All department of the University have internet facility and a computer centre. This has also been extended to the Library. Modern teaching aids like multimedia projectors, power point presentations, and internet are continuously used for teaching. These may involve video, audio or presentation skills.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 Does the University have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of? The University has developed a feedback mechanism.

The University is conducting various seminar and conference. Under the IQAC cell there are various workshops which have been conducted and a

feedback is taken from the participants. The feedback is used to improve the functioning of the University.

1.4.2 Does the University elicit feedback on the curriculum from national and international faculty? If yes, specify a few methods such as conducting webinars, workshops, online discussions, etc. and its impact.

The University continuously conducts webinars in various departments. The University promotes its faculty to go for international assignments. It also calls international faculty to conduct lectures and on seminars and conferences.

1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which affiliated institutions give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

The University promotes seminars and conference among the affiliating institutions. College Development Council has been formed for the purpose of interacting with the colleges. There is a continuous feedback from the colleges through a representation of the faculty in various academic bodies like the Board of Studies and in Departmental Committees. Members are also co-opted from various affiliating institutions.

1.4.4 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the University in ensuring the effective development of the curricula?

Some of the measure taken by the University in the last five years to improve the quality is -

- 1. University regularly assesses the curricula by analyzing feedback received from industry, alumni, academia, and other stakeholders through formal and informal channels for qualitative improvements in the courses.
- 2. Regular faculty board meetings are convened in order to seek suggestive inputs from the experts. The information so collected is debated and then subsequently approved by the respective academic bodies. The University also takes care to ensure that curricula so designed is in tune with the norms and standards recommended by the regulatory authorities like UGC/AICTE etc.
- 3. Most of the teaching departments have updated and enriched their course curricula both at the UG/PG levels in accordance with the latest developments in their respective subjects. The University undertakes this exercise at regular intervals in all the subjects. Revision of courses at the UG and PG level is taken up generally after every two years.
- 4. There is a statutory provision for the external members in research committees and UG/PG Boards of Studies which ensures regular improvement, comparability, and quality enhancement in curriculum development and research.
- 5. The University linguistic department and English department have developed some modules for communication skill development of the students. In addition to that the computer science department also runs some courses like PGDCA, BCA etc.
- 6. Semester system of examination has been introduced in all the PG courses.

- 7. The University emphasizes use of computers in teaching-learning processes. Accordingly, it has done extensive computerization and provided internet facilities on large scale, with access on the entire campus.
- 8. To encourage foreign students, the University has made provisions of foreign students through exchange programmes and also has an International Students Hostel.
- 9. The University provides flexibility to students to move from one discipline to another after completing a course in one discipline, by allowing admission in any other course/discipline as a fresh candidate subject to his/her meeting the eligibility conditions for the desired new course.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the University ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The University has been adopting transparency from time to time. The University in its latest efforts has been upgrading its admission process and making it state of the art with latest technology. Admission process is now online and the students can make all their applications and check their admission notification online. All the notifications are advertised on the website of the University and a few selected newspapers as well as on the notice boards of the University. The University clearly indicates the respective department, the number of seats available in each of the courses, their fee structures, their course syllabus, duration of the courses, the respective faculty to teach the courses. Over and above this the University clearly states the various facilities available in the University to make the aspirant aware before taking admission. The University declares the process of admitting the student before hand through the notifications. The applications are received for respective courses and the students are invited for counseling. In case of any discrepancy the student has the right to represent his case and the complaint is heard by the relevant authority.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place by the University. List the criteria for admission: (e.g.: (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common entrance test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) other criteria followed by the University (please specify).

The University has adopted and online process of admission to all the Masters and Bachelors courses. The academic council decides the criterion for admission to every course each year. At present the University has adopted the criterion of merit in the last course completed. The process of normalization is adopted for the purpose of arriving at the merit. The University has aligned itself with the National Tests and is admitting students by IIM CAT in its Management (Masters) courses. The University has adopted an entrance test of its own, however the aspirants who have qualified national test are exempted from such test and admitted directly as per the availability, falling under the rules of the University. The rules and weightings criterion for admission are given in Annexure 3.

2.1.3 Provide details of admission process in the affiliated colleges and the University's role in monitoring the same.

The University has formed a College Development Council, which looks after the appropriate representation in the college committee; this ensures a proper representation of the respective stakeholders. The University ensures that the colleges do not admit student over and above the sanctioned capacity, they have enough teachers to teach, they have proper facilities for the students, and they comply with the relevant rules.

2.1.4 Does the University have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profile annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The University provides information regarding availability of seats and rules regarding admission process well in time. The previous year trends are discussed in the admission committee and finally on the basis of deliberations at academic council the final policy of admission is decided. It is a continuous process and it contributes a lot to the development of transparent and efficient student friendly admission system.

2.1.5 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for students belonging to the following categories:

- * SC/ST
- * OBC
- * Women
- * Persons with varied disabilities
- * Economically weaker sections
- * Outstanding achievers in sports and other extracurricular activities

The state of Uttar Pradesh has a number of policies for the upliftment of socially and economically weaker sections of the society. As a state University the University of Lucknow is duty bound to implement these policies in its admission process. The University provides reservation of seats as per the government policy to the SC, STs and OBCs. The University provides full exemption of fees to the SC and ST candidates, while in the case of OBCs exemption is based on their economic conditions. The fee instead is reimbursed to the University by the social welfare department.

Players of National repute who are at the first, a second or third position at the national level a direct admission is provided by the University. In addition the players who have completed intermediate courses from sports hostels and colleges are eligible to get a direct admission. The candidates who have been state players or national players but are not position holders are eligible for a 5% weightage in the marks. Women are eligible for a 5% weightage in LLB 5 years and LLB 3 year courses. The University aims at getting at least 20% girls each of the courses, this is well reflected in the current enrolled students where the enrolment of girls in nearly each of the courses hovers around 50%.

The University has a policy of weightage reservation for the persons with varied disabilities. The students with certain disabilities are also given a writer and extra time may also be given to them. The University has well developed system of ramps for students with physical disabilities. There are fully developed ramps for the students to reach every building.

2.1.8 Were any programmes discontinued/staggered by the University in the last four years? If yes, please specify the reasons.

The University has a policy of running only those self finance courses which are viable and have a demand ratio of at least 0.4. The University admission committee and academic council always keep a check on this pointer and some of the courses are suspended from time to time as per requirement.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 Does the University organize orientation / induction programme for fresher's? If yes, give details such as the duration, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

The departmental committee takes care of these issues regularly and the faculty members involved in the first year teaching are asked to interact with the students and orient them for their meaningful University life. The proctorial board of the University is very sensitive towards the issues of ragging, time to time it sends different circulars and notices to students and faculty entrusted with the job of managing

the hostels regarding ways and means of checking this Menes. The University is very sensitive towards gender equality; the women grievance cell is fully functional and takes care of the related issues.

2.2.2 Does the University have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of the student population" are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

We do not have any set mechanism in this regard but the faculty members are advised time to time by the faculty board/departmental committee to look in to the special needs of the different students.

2.2.3 Does the University offer bridge / remedial / add-on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

The University runs remedial coaching for the SC/ST candidates to prepare them for NET exam and also for the entry in services. In addition to that University also has a minority coaching centre to impart remedial coaching to minority students for various competitive exams. The different departments also organize remedial/ extra classes on Sundays if required.

2.2.4 Has the University conducted any study on the academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped, slow learners, etc.? If yes, what are the main findings?

The University has a policy to provide equal opportunity to the students belonging to disadvantageous category and it has a Equal Opportunity Cell functional for this purpose. The reservation policies, other schemes of the State as well as Central government are followed in true spirit. They have been encouraged to avail the various scholarships/ research awards etc declared by various funding agencies. The University has a couple of studies in pipeline for the above issue.

2.2.5 How does the University identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are encouraged to attend various activities of academic nature during summer vacations and some of the departments offer summer training to the students for their interaction with industries.

In addition to that the different departments of the University organize extension lectures and workshops/ seminars for students. "Sanskritiki" (a body responsible for the cultural activities) often organizes quiz contests debate, dumb character for the students. A detailed process of responding to the needs of the students has also been well outlined under the diagram in 1.1. The learning needs are well understood by interacting with the various stakeholders in the environment.

2.3. Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the University plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)?

The University of Lucknow has Semester as well as Annual System in UG and PG courses respectively. The Semester exams are held in December and May every year. Annual examinations are held during March-April.

The University drafts an academic calendar, which is declared at the start of the session and is posted on the website. All the departments follow the academic calendar. It is ensured that all norms of all the statutory bodies are well complied with.

The University has a well drafted system of examinations and appropriate panels for paper setters/examiners for the semester/annual examination are considered by the Board of Studies and approved by Academic Council. The University has a Central Evaluation System. The results are declared on time. Various facilitating bodies of the University like Internal Quality Assurance Cell, Athletic Association, Sanskritiki etc. have a well drafted calendar for the academic year at the start of the session.

2.3.2 Does the University provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

The University ensures that the entire syllabuses are available on the website, in addition to the syllabus being available in the respective departments. The students have an easy access to the entire syllabus at all times.

- 2.3.3 Does the University face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional measures to overcome these. The University has not faced any problem in completing the curriculum in the last five years. In case of any special requirement for additional inputs the University provides for extra classes through the respective departments.
- 2.3.4 How learning is made student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contributes to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

The University follows a well crafted system of making learning student centric. The University understands the needs of the environment and acts accordingly. At the level of initiating new courses, the University launches new courses as and when desired, not only that it also suspends a few courses if they are out of the mainstream. The syllabus is continuously upgraded as per the needs and requirements of the respective sectors.

2.3.5 What is the University's policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to deliver lectures and/or organize seminars for students?

The University has a policy of inviting faculty from national and international organizations. The University has decentralized the process of inviting professionals. The departments, faculties and

specific bodies are free to invited professionals for special lectures. There are many forums that use universities platform to conduct such specialized lectures. Dr. Anil Kakodkar, Prof. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam, Dr. Montek Singh Ahluwalia, Dr. Kaushik Basu, Dr. Vijayan, Prof. J. V. Narlikar who are international personalities from India have graced numerous functions at the University. Many others have graced the University at various point of time

2.3.6 Does the University formally encourage blended learning by using elearning resources?

The University has gone ahead with blended learning. A number of proficiency courses were used as an additional course for completing a main course. Additional courses on Information Technology literacy, e-learning methods and the like are encouraged continuously among the students and the teachers.

2.3.7 What are the technologies and facilities such as virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources and mobile education used by the faculty for effective teaching?

The University has a video conferencing centre which is used for various kinds of video conferencing facilities. The University is developing a elearning portal that will enhance e-learning among the teachers. The portal is designed to impart teaching to the students. IQAC recently organized a workshop for teachers on various issues of e-learning. The portal will have open educational resources for the students. One of the class rooms in some of the departments has been developed as a multimedia classroom.

The University has tried to make a number of classrooms having I connectivity. They have internet nodes for teaching for example in the Business Administration Building of the first campus and in the second campus the building hosting management course has also been made wi-fi ready.

2.3.10 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.

Some of the departments in the University have counselor/ mentors/ advisors appointed for the students. These committees help the students at time of consultations.

2.3.11 Were any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve learning? What were the methods used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the

faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

The University has taken up into OHP, LCD, Case Method of teaching, Industrial Visits, Webinars, Seminars, Role Play, Presentation, City Visits, Educational Tours, on the job trainings, field works and many more. These have improved the delivery and understanding of the students. The students are asked for a feedback to understand how to impart education in a better way.

2.3.12 How does the University create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

"Sanskritiki" (a body responsible for the cultural activities) is a vibrant body which takes care of extracurricular activities of students. It has many clubs which regularly organize different cultural and academic fest throughout the year. The calendar of events and all the activities are regularly published on the website of the University. In addition to this organized feature the different departments also organize seminars, workshops, lectures and exhibitions to inculcate scientific temper and research orientation of the students.

2.3.13 Does the University consider student projects mandatory in the learning programme? If yes, for how many programmes have they been (percentage of total) made mandatory?

* Number of projects executed within the University

At the master's level, 80% of the courses, the students have to do a mandatory project. The students in these programmes have to complete a project at the end of their masters' course. Another kind of project is on the job project, and is in the form of a -on the job training. This is normally held during the summer vacations. All the above projects are also assigned marks. The faculty members guide the students during the project completion.

* Names of external institutions associated with the University for student project work

Most of the corporate houses in Lucknow and a number of them bared in Delhi which include Banks, Reserve Bank of India, government Research institutions like IITR, NBRI, CIMAP, Sugarcane Research Institute, Pisiculture Department, Animal Husbandry Department etc and a list of many more are associated with various department of the University. The private sector public limited companies and NGOs too are associated with the University. The associations are developed each year on a student requirement basis.

* Role of faculty in facilitating such projects

The faculty with its experience guides the students at the time of initiation of the project. They also monitor the progress and help the students in finalizing the report of the project.

2.3.14 Does the University have a well qualified pool of human resource to meet the requirements of the curriculum? If there is a shortfall, how is it supplemented?

Yes the University has a pool of well qualified faculty members and supporting staff. Regular recruitments are done time to time as per

requirement. The University also engages the retired faculty members and experts from the other institutions as guest faculty especially for the self finance courses.

2.3.15 How are the faculty enabled to prepare computer-aided teaching/learning materials? What are the facilities available in the University for such efforts?

Most of the departments are equipped with multimedia facilities and have at least one class room as model class room, where teaching can be imparted with the help of blended pedagogical methods.

The University is in the process of developing a e-learning portal that will enhance e-learning among the teachers. The portal is designed to impart teaching to the students. IQAC recently organized a workshop for teachers on the issue of e-learning. The portal will have open educational resources for the students.

2.3.16 Does the University have a mechanism for the evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation feedback used to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The mechanism of the student feedback on the evaluation of teaching is presently voluntary. Many faculty members encourage students to provide feedback so that they can improve their communication with students. Different teachers adopt different methodologies for this purpose like feedback forms, feedback notes of posting feedback on their portal or email.

2.4.1 How does the University plan and manage its human resources to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum?







The University advertises the vacant positions regularly in the national daily and also on the University website. The qualification and eligibility conditions are at par with those provided by UGC. The applications received are thoroughly scrutinized and a statutory selection committee appoints the most suitable candidate. The University administration always takes care that the most qualified/ eligible candidate gets a chance to be appointed as faculty member. The University has appointed almost 21 teachers in last four years.

2.4.5 How many Emeritus / Adjunct Faculty / Visiting Professors are on the rolls of the University?

Almost 5 emirates professors are working in the University.

2.4.6 What policies/systems are in place to academically recharge and rejuvenate teachers (e.g. providing research grants, study leave, nomination to national/international conferences/seminars, in-service training, organizing national/international conferences etc.)?

The University encourages its faculty for applying in different scholarships/fellowships available at national and international level. They are provided study leave/ privilege leave/ duty leave for availing these facilities. The faculty members are also encouraged to attend workshops and seminars in India and abroad, their expenses are reimbursed from the unassigned grant of the UGC. Some time in special cases University also provide additional grants from general funds also. The faculty members are also encouraged to organize conferences/ workshops/ seminars and lectures by providing financial and administrative support.

To encourage the sponsored research among the faculty member the

University give liberty to the principal investigator of the projects to procurer items up to 20000/- Rs. without any purchase committee and up to 1 lakh by quotation only. 50% of the overhead amount is provided to the PI for maintaining his/her laboratory.

Different departments of the University organize programmes for curriculum development, teaching-learning methods, examination reforms time to time and these aspects are also discussed in the departmental committee meetings on regular basis.

* Mobility of faculty between universities for teaching?

The University has instituted a mechanism of long term leaves and a faculty is eligible to take five years of leave. This long leave could be availed for better opportunities either for national or international assignment. The University has had faculty exchange programme with STANFORD Business School, USA in the past. The University has also associations with ICTP Italy and University of Long Beach California. Respective departments leverage institutions in interrelated areas. There are a number of faculties who have been visiting many institutions in Malaysia, Thailand, Argentina, Brazil, USA, and Europe.

* Faculty exchange programmes with national and international bodies?

As in the above the faculties continuously are involved in exchanges. The exchanges move out more to other institutions than faculties coming from other countries to this University.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1. How does the University ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are in place?

The University has a well designed evaluation process of students. Students and faculty members (of University and affiliated colleges) are aware of the marks bifurcation of different questions both in theory and practical exam. The overall marks distribution of different section of the syllabi and design of the question paper is also known of them. Notices regarding any changes in the above mentioned system are well circulated in advance so that the stake holders are well aware in advance.

The process of moderation is in practice and all the question papers pass through this process before they are printed. The paper setters are required to submit a model answer papers before the start of evaluation process in order to maintain uniformity in the evaluation.

There are number of provisions like scrutiny etc. by which students can submit their representation regarding the marks obtained. The students are also entitled to see their evaluated answer books and get the photocopies of them by paying a nominal fee of 300 rupees.

2.5.2. What are the important examination reforms initiated by the University and to what extent have they been implemented in the University departments and affiliated colleges? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the examination management system.

The University has initiated various reforms in the examination system. Pass marks and grace marks rules have also been made more student-friendly and simpler. The University has provided partial autonomy to departments for paper-setting and evaluation in order that results are declared in time.

The most effective and student friendly reform has come after the implementation of RTI act. The University has now made students entitled to see their evaluated answer books and get the photocopies of them by paying a nominal fee of 300 Rupees. This single reform has improved the quality of evaluation process by making it completely transparent

2.5.3. What is the average time taken by the University for Declaration of examination results? In case of delay, what measures have been taken to address them? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the University for the publication of examination results (*e.g.* website, SMS, email, etc.).

The University results are generally declared within 45 day in the case of UG annual examinations (in UG classes results of all the colleges are included). The PG results of semester based examinations are declared in 30 days. The computerization of the exam and result related process has helped the University to improve the process and the results are also prepared in house by University computer centre and digital processing cell. The results are posted on the University website timely and also displayed on the departmental notice board.

2.5.4. How does the University ensure transparency in the evaluation process? What are the rigorous features introduced by the University to ensure confidentiality?

The University has adopted a system of central evaluation for both the UG and PG courses. The PG examination answer books are coded before evaluation to maintain confidentiality. In the case of UG evaluation a process of "Random Distribution" of answer books to evaluator is adopted. The examiners for practical and theory evaluation for every paper is been decided by the board of studies. The University also has a system of calling external examiner in the practical examinations.

A panel of examiners are proposed by board of studies of respective departments for evaluation of M. Phil. and Ph. D. thesis, The Vice Chancellor choose two examiners out of this panel to be appointed as examiner for the evaluation of thesis.

Moreover the University has now made students entitled to see their evaluated answer books and get the photocopies of them by paying a nominal fee of 300 Rupees. This single reform has improved the quality of evaluation process by making it completely transparent.

2.5.5. Does the University have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

- * Pre-examination processes Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.
- * Examination process Examination material management, logistics, etc.
- * Post-examination process Attendance capture, OMR-based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing, certification, etc.

The University has a centralized examination department under direct control of a Controller of Examination. This department provides an integrated platform for all pre and post examination activities ranging from examination schedule generation to the declaration of the results.

2.5.6. Has the University introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

A panel of examiners are proposed by board of studies of respective departments for evaluation of M. Phil. and Ph. D. thesis, The Vice Chancellor choose two examiners out of this panel to be appointed as examiner for the evaluation of thesis. If the reports are not positive then one more examiner is appointed to revaluate the thesis. Out of those one of the examiners is invited for viva voce exam which is open to everybody.

2.5.7. Has the University created any provision for including the name of the college in the degree certificate?

With reference to evaluation and reforms, the University has always been keen in given the colleges a parity with the main campus academics. The University has created a College Development Council and the council is in the process of bringing in the reforms. As of now the colleges are given a title in the mark sheets of the students. Hence there is always a parity treatment with colleges.

2.5.8. What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to examinations?

There are number of provisions like scrutiny by thorough examination office which students can submit their representation regarding the marks obtained. The students are also entitled to see their evaluated answer books and get the photocopies of them by paying a nominal fee of 300 rupees. If there is a disparity in the marking system the students are redressed accordingly.

2.5.9. What efforts have been made by the University to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved the process and functioning of the examination division/section.

The University has gone in for massive computerization of examinations processes. The day the student enters the University, she/he is allotted a single enrolment number. The examinations system takes into consideration this enrolment number/ roll number and process the results accordingly. The process is completely computerized and the results are processed in house by the University Computer Centre. The results are posted on the University Website for all the courses. The University in its efforts to upgrade the processes further has decided to post the admit card of the student online and

the students will be able to print them on their own.

2.6. Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1. Has the University articulated its graduate attributes? If so, how does it facilitate and monitor its implementation and outcome?

University life offers up opportunities to try new ventures for the students. We have a lot of activities for the students other than lecture, labs and libraries like two sports fields, NCC, Sanskritiki, Gymnasium, NSS, and Students Union. There are many other activities like poster competition, students clubs, e newsletters etc. and these activities are quite often managed by student clubs. The University ensures that these activities are properly managed. Teachers are involved to head these organizations.

2.6.2. Does the University have clearly stated learning outcomes for its academic programmes/departments? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The board of studies of departments meets regularly to discuss ways and means of assessing student learning. It always guides its faculty members on the design of the question paper. It also decides the contents as per the latest requirements in the respective subjects. The board also has the purview of guiding the faculty members on the process of evaluation for proper grading of the student's performance/result in accordance with his learning.

In the professional courses there is an internal assessment weightage of 30%. The internal assessment consists of continuous assessment, internal examination, class participations, project presentation and the likes.

2.6.3. How are the University's teaching, learning and assessment strategies structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes? The University of Lucknow is the State University of Uttar Pradesh and the state is not very high on Per capita Income. The University's mandate is to serve the student in order to uplift the citizens of its state and in the same has extended its teaching activities through a number of colleges. The learning outcomes are always kept in mind and the University teaching in aligned with the needs of the environment. The University has a number of boards and bodies to look after the delivery of education. Each of the bodies like the Department Committee, Faculty Board and Academic Council have representation from various recognized sections as desired. All these activities help in the delivery of the above objectives.

2.6.4. How does the University collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it to overcome the barriers to learning?

All the data of the results is computerized and the University analyses the data. The University also takes into consideration the performance of its students in various competitive examinations and accordingly uses these outcomes in furthering the academic processes like modifications in syllabi and evaluation.

The University has come up with model classrooms. The University is introducing new experiments in Science Streams. It also includes field

visits, group discussions, role plays, webinars, seminars, conference participations etc. Moot courts are a regular activity in Law Faculty courses.

3.1. Promotion of Research

The University has Departmental Research Degree Committees (DRC) in each subject to monitor and promotes research in the respective fields. The Head of Department is Chairperson of the committee. All the professors, two associate professors, two assistant professors and all the concerned supervisors are its members. Some time external members are also invited if required. These Committees meets annually or bi-annually to approve the topics of research in various subject areas.

3.1.2. What is the policy of the University to promote research in its affiliated / constituent colleges?

Yes the University has a policy to promote research in the colleges. The affiliated college teachers can collaborate with the labs and other research groups of University and carry on their research work. They can also access the library and other resources of the University. They are invited to attend different conferences/ workshops/ seminars organized by the University. Till now the college teachers are not entitled for supervising Ph.D. thesis but the college development council formed by the University is trying to finalize the process by which the college teachers can also guide students.

3.1.3. What are the proactive mechanisms adopted by the University to facilitate the smooth implementation of research schemes/projects?

Advancing funds for sanctioned projects: The University permits drawl of advance for the purchase of equipments, instruments, chemicals, glassware, etc. from the project funds.

Providing seed money: The University provides basic facilities for undertaking research.

Simplification of procedures related to sanctions / purchases to be made by the investigators out of project funds and research grants: University purchase policy allows the purchase of items costing up to Rs. 20000/- without calling quotations, up to Rs. 100,000/- through a purchase committee, and at DGS&D/DS&D rates without any limit. Annual rate contracts are finalized well in advance for all important items such as chemicals, glassware, etc.

Autonomy granted to the principal investigator/coordinator for utilizing overhead charges: The Principal Investigator has been delegated all administrative and financial powers to spend 50% of funds at his/ her own level. The University also considers additional funds from the overhead if the need is urgent.

Timely release of grants: The University administration monitors the proper and timely mobilization of funds allocated to the PIs.

Timely auditing: It is the responsibility of the account office to get the accounts audited by the govt. auditors, and records thereto are maintained by them.

Submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities: Utilization certificates, duly audited and signed by the PI, Finance Officer and the Registrar, are regularly submitted to the funding agencies.

The interdisciplinary research and collaborations with national/international institutes / industries is encouraged by University. Teachers of various departments have freedom to independently and / or in collaboration with their other sister departments submit research project proposals to various funding agencies. The Department of Science and technology, Government of India has sanctioned funds for generating research facilities in science faculty. The University has had faculty exchange programme with Stanford Business School, USA in the past. The University has also associations with ICTP Italy and University of Long Beach California. Respective departments leverage institutions in interrelated areas. There are a number of faculties who have been visiting many institutions in Malaysia, Thailand, Argentina, Brazil, USA, Europe. In addition to that the various faculty members of the University are doing collaborative research with almost all the prominent national and international universities/ institutions

- 3.3. Research Facilities
- 3.3.1. What efforts have been made by the University to improve its infrastructure requirements to facilitate research? What strategies have been evolved to meet the needs of researchers in emerging disciplines?

The University encourages its faculty members to generate research facilities by writing research projects to the different agencies in the emerging fields. In addition to individual projects, University also approach different agencies/organizations to generate research funding. The University has received grants under PURSE scheme of DST and the ONGC has also committed Rs. 10 crores grant for establishing a centre of interdisciplinary research.

3.3.2. Does the University have an Information Resource Centre to cater to the needs of researchers? If yes, provide details of the facility.

The University is having a leased line of 8 mbps bandwidth and almost every department has access to internet through this leased line. The various journals are available in the departments through INFLIBNET scheme of UGC. The central library also has a facility of 30 nodes for the research scholars and faculty members to access information resources available.

3.3.3. Does the University have a University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC)? If yes, have the facilities been made available to research scholars? What is the funding allotted to USIC?

The University has a centralized computer center which looks after the need of the computer and networking related issues of the whole of the University. We have a mechanical and electronics workshop at the department of physics and a glass blowing unit at department of chemistry. Recently the ONGC has also committed Rs. 10 crores grant for establishing a centre of interdisciplinary research with advanced instruments.

3.3.4. Does the University provide residential facilities (with computer and

The hostels of the University have computer with internet connection in the common room readily available to the inmates. We also have internet connectivity at its guest house.

The University has a plan to develop research development council to address all these issues.

Nearly all the departments of the science faculty have vibrant research groups with state of the art facilities for experimental work. The University also houses a computer cluster for data analysis. Almost all the University teaching departments have research collaborations with every national institutions and University of eminence. The University also have collaboration with Long beach University, California under student exchange programme, Federation agreement with International Centre for Theoretical Physics, research collaborations with Korean University in 2007 in the areas of economics, management & development studies, MOU with Urban Centre of the University for support and training to urban local bodies, UNDP has provided Grant to the urban centre. The University also has linkages with the United Nations, The World Bank, International Labor Organization, USAID, State Planning Commission, Planning Commission, Ministry of Finance, IIM–Lucknow & Bangaluru, SGPGI & CSMMU, Lucknow etc. and 15 collaborations with the international institutions/ universities.

In addition to these the individual faculty members also have collaboration and linkage with eminent research groups.

The linkages with the academic and research institutions enable the faculty to keep abreast with the latest developments in their respective areas of interest/specializations. It helps the faculty to benchmark their course curricula with those of the other leading institutions.

Internship: The linkages with the academic and research institutions enable the students to complete their projects and provide opportunities to the students of the University to work with leading scientists in their respective areas of research interest.

On-the-job training: In some cases provision of on-the-job training is incorporated in linkages with the institutions with which University has entered into academic and research collaborations. All professional courses offered by the University have in-built element of on-the-job training.

Faculty exchange and development: The collaborations and linkages help in generation and dissemination of knowledge both qualitatively and quantitatively. All the current institutional linkages with the University primarily entail collaborative research. Accordingly, the faculty comes across newer ideas and techniques to improve their teaching skills and research endeavours.

Research: Faculty visiting advanced labs and research institutions gets exposure to the latest research techniques and trends. It help the faculty members to do better research work and access to latest resources, research tools and instruments of research. It has also increased the number of interdisciplinary research going on in the campus.

Publications: The publication profile of the University faculty has improved qualitatively and quantitatively by the linkages developed with the peer institutions. These have helped the researchers to get access on sophisticated equipments, statistical tools, database etc., which otherwise may not have been possible. This interaction has produced quality research, resulting in research publications finding space in the leading international journals.

Consultancy: This is one area which still has a lot of scope and could be developed in future.

Extension activities: The extension activities have been improved broadly by the linkages established. As per regional and social requirements, the University faculty collaborates with NGOs and other institutions for creating awareness on various issues of social concern, as also for providing vocational training.

Student placement: By the linkages developed by University departments they have established direct contact with the prospective employers. Therefore students on passing out their respective courses of study are able to find gainful employment in reputed institutions/organizations on their own. Departments offering professional programmes have established linkages with the industry.

The University has fully functional planning and development board. This board goes through all the demands and requirement proposed by the different departments of the University. It also looks at the future plans of the University and apply for the funds in the different schemes of Govt. and it's agencies, both at state and central level. The board also allocates the funds received from funding agencies and monitors the utilization of these funds. This ensures optimal utilization of funds and infrastructure.

University is in the process of constant and consistent development of it's infrastructure. Recently University has constructed 50 model class rooms with the funding from state government. These multimedia equipped class rooms are helping the faculty to use modern technology of pedagogy. Recently University has installed a computer cluster in its campus from the funds made available by central government. This state of the art computer facility is boon for researchers from different faculty.

4.1.3. How does the University create a conducive physical ambience for the faculty in terms of adequate research laboratories, computing facilities and allied services?

The University is sensitive towards the needs of faculty for their research related activities. It provides adequate space, power backup facility, internet connection with large bandwidth, furniture and dedicated computers. Recently it has also installed a centralized computer cluster to fulfill the needs of high end computing.

Yes. The departments of University have adequate office space, common room, public utility space etc.

Entrance of all the building in the University has ramps. The University has constructed separate toilets (for girls and boys) on ground floor of the campus with ramp entrance for differently abled students. The EOC of the University also looks for the needs of differently able students and provide them equipment's for their special needs from time to time.

They also subscribe newspapers and magazine and have a small library cum ready rooms in hostel. All the hostels have computer with internet connectivity in common rooms. Many indoor and some outdoor sports facility are also available in hostel.

The University has a full functional dispensary with resident doctors and paramedic staff in the campus. There has a budget allotted of rupees 50, 00,000 for this purpose.

University has a full functional athletic association (LUAA). This central body is responsible for the sports related activities in the campus .The University has cricket, hockey football basketball, T.T., baseball, tennis, soft ball, athletics etc, clubs under LUAA for promoting sport activities among the student. Sanskritiki is the institution in the University which call the need of culture activity of students.

The central library is headed by an honorary librarian. The committee of the deans is on advisory board of the library. The library has a computer center with 50 modes. All the modes has also internet correction.

The University has invested heavily on building on computer infrastructure. All the offices and department have LAN connectivity and have latest desktop and printers. Around one hundred fifty (150) computer are used in offices and around six hundred (600) systems are used for students. Around 850 nodes are available on LAN, V.C. office and residence is Wi-Fi facility.

4.3.3. What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The University has constituted an IT task force, a centralized committee to look into various aspects and dimension of IT related activities. This task force is an apex body which looks after the immediate needs a future expansion plan of the institutions. This task force i9s responsible for purchase of various hardware, software, their copyright and licensing issues, resource sharing and e-waste management. This task force is also responsible for future up gradation of networking and office automation issues.

The University is in the process of building an e-learning portal. It has started the process of training the faculty members for their contributory role. The University has constructed 50 model class rooms for the purpose of teaching with the facility of ICT.

The University never uses the available resources for any commercial use. It organize different programs about the copyright issue for it's faculty time to time. The IT task force is also entrusted with this issue.

The University has constructed 50 model class rooms in the different departments for the purpose of teaching with new techniques. Practical component in learning like project work, etc, is introduced in many subjects at P.G. level. Faculties are advised by their respective board to use ICT facility in the process of learning.

Computers, printers and internet with LAN connection is available to all the faculty members. They also purchase different supplementary software's according to their research need from the funds generated by them. The centralized computer cluster also has some programs and stastical tools available to all the faculty members.

50 class rooms are made in different departments of University from the state government grants. The location of the class rooms is given in the profile of the departments.

The IQAC of the University has taken initiative in this regard. It has started organizing workshops for the faculty members in this order to build capacity for this purpose. The faculty members from affiliated colleges are also asked to join this initiative.

Presently the University has no mechanism of centralized maintenance of IT infrastructure. IT task force is looking into this problem and going to provide a solution for this.

Yes, the University has connectivity provided through the National Knowledge Network connectivity. The University has received a router (JUNIPER MX 80). This is being used for network connectivity to the entire University.

All the free resources are available on University network. IT task force is entrusted with job to have a policy on open source information management.

The University has a system to support and mentor the students on the campus through some of the statutory bodies like Lucknow University Athletic Association, Sanskritiki, Delegacy centers etc. The University develop various schemes for the welfare of the students undertaken by the Dean, Students Welfare. There is a Students Union building and girls common room for their activities. The various department and professional courses arrange educational tours and the department also have a tradition for the fresher's and farewell parties for PG students. Facility of bus and railway concession is arranged for the students visiting their home or going for some other academic assignment. Several medals including chancellor's medal are awarded to the deserving students under different subjects. There is a student welfare fund under Dean, Student welfare. The University also provides medical facility to the students through a dispensary run under supervision of Dean, Student welfare. The medical emergencies and other problems were taken care of by Proctor and Provosts of the hostels. For wholesome personality development of the students, various cultural, literary, and adventurous events of local, regional and national importance are organized by the University. Various camps and courses are arranged at different places by NCC and NSS as mentioned in the previous section of the report for inculcation of social responsibility in the students. The University provides residential accommodation on the campus to in its students in hostels each for girls and

The University provides ample opportunities for the students to develop and grow in their academic and other related fields in addition to the class room teaching. The various departments/institutes frequently organize national and international level seminars/ workshops and conferences where the students get opportunities to interact with experts in their respective fields, as also with their seniors in the subject. The University Alumni Association and the Alumni Associations of the respective departments have been meeting from time to time to provide a platform to the students to come in contact with their seniors who are working in different spheres.

The departments also arrange and organize special lectures/workshops in association with the various academic societies to provide an academic exposure to the students. The University also celebrates its foundation day and convocation week regularly and arranges lectures of eminent scholars for the benefit of students.

All The department running professional courses have their own career counseling and placement cells. These cells organize career fests regularly. The University has a central placement and guidance bureau to cater the needs of the students. The individual faculty members also interact with students for their orientation and career guidance.

The University has a fully functional equal opportunity cell (EOC) to provide the special thrust and focused attention towards the issues concerning SC, ST, OBC, Women and Physically Challenged, which has a mandate "Equitable access to quality higher education is an essential prerequisite for realizing the Constitutional promise of 'Equality of Opportunity' as well as achieving the goal of inclusive development, as outlined in the Twelfth Plan. The disabling environment of academic institutions on account of socio-cultural and economic barriers needs to be corrected for fair representation of the marginalized section of the society. Owing to the special needs the physically challenged person need special care in terms of creation/alteration in the infrastructure facilities designed for 'normal' individuals."

The University has a on campus dispensary with resident Doctor and paramedic staff with annual budget of Rs. 50, 00, 00 under supervision of Dean Students welfare.

The overall skill development is supported by bodies like Lucknow University Athletic Association, Sanskritiki, Delegacy centers etc.

The University runs two free coaching center one for SC/ ST candidates and one for Minority community students.

This body is responsible to encourage sport atmosphere in the University and also look in to the matter of direct admission of reputed players. There are five delegacy centers to provide sports facility to the students living in the city, while the provosts of every hostel arrange sports facilities to its inmates. The chief provost also arrange a Inter Hostel tournament regularly.

The University has centralized guidance and placement bureau. Various departments have their own placement cell.

The University in the last four years has been approached by corporates like SBI. Reliance. Infosys, Telco, IBM, Nestle, Kriol mind free consultancy etc. Nearly 30% of students of these programmes have been able to secure job on campus.




The Sanskritiki has different clubs for different cultural activities. Each club has at least one female office bearer to encourage the participation of the female candidates.

















































5.2.2. What is the programme-wise completion rate during the time span stipulated by the University?

The UG, PG, diploma and various certificate courses are of fixed duration. Almost 90% students complete theses courses in stipulated time. In the case of Ph. D. course the minimum time limit is specified but most of the time the course is completed in 4-5 years (80% cases). Only 10% students are able to complete it in minimum time limit.

The executive council itself is a constitution of various representatives which include, business representatives, judiciary representatives, academicians, Chancellor's Nominee and any other stakeholder representative as deemed important. This ensures that there is a proper interaction with the stakeholders at the apex level. In addition the department keep on interacting with the stakeholders to keep the courses and curriculums in line with times.

* in reinforcing a culture of excellence?

The University apex body the Executive Council is sensitive towards the cultural and cross cultural issues and always tries to draw guidelines to develop a culture of excellent in administration as well as academics.

* in identifying organizational needs and striving to fulfill them? The Planning and Development Board of the University of Lucknow is a statutory body created under the statutes of the University and this body looks at identifying the needs of the institution and fulfilling them At the level of

infrastructure development there is Works Department. The works department caters to the universities needs of how the University will be developed in terms of infrastructure of classes, general infrastructure of the campus, hostels, houses of employees and teachers, roads and electricity etc. All the proposals are looked at the apex body and appropriate action is taken.

6.2.7. Does the University have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

The University is in the process of creating a mechanism for analyzing the

student feedback on institutional performance. Although at various points of time the students are inquired about their feedback on institutional performance but this has not been recorded.

6.2.8. Does the University conduct performance audit of the various departments?

The University is in the process of coming up with a performance audit mechanism.

6.2.9. What mechanisms have been evolved by the University to identify the developmental needs of its affiliated institutions?

A continuous interaction with the affiliated institutions is kept and this ensures that the University identifies the developmental needs of the affiliated institutions. College Development Council (CDC) is an apex body to look into these details.

6.2.10. Does the University have a vibrant College Development Council (CDC) / Board of College and University Development (BCUD)? If yes, detail its structure, functions and achievements.

The University has created a College Development Council and this council is in the process of developing new ways and means of better managing the colleges. The council has already put in place a number of mismanaged issues in associated colleges on track and has ensured proper representation within the board.

6.3. Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1. What efforts have been made to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff?

The UGC, Academic Staff College of Lucknow regularly holds courses in different streams for the University faculty members. The teachers are financially assisted through grants for attending workshops, conference and seminars within and outside India. There is provision for proper leaves for attending these activities. The IQAC cell of the University holds regular workshops for the students, teachers and employees. The computer centre initiates computer training programs. The University is going to hold a massive programme on ICT. The University is also providing to employees computer allowance.

6.3.2. What is the outcome of the review of various appraisal methods used by the University? List the important decisions.

The University has been able to upgrade its efficiency, through such programmes. The faculty members give self-appraisal and the employee's confidential report is submitted by their departmental head. These are the annual exercises in the University.

6.3.3. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have benefitted from these schemes in the last four years? Give details.

The University is a state government University and the rules applied are the State Government rules in this regard.

6.3.4. What are the measures taken by the University for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The University is offering sixth pay commission for payment as salaries to its employees. The University provides academic leave to have proper up gradation of academic standards for a better academic life.

6.3.5. Has the University conducted a gender audit during the last four years? If yes, mention a few salient findings.

Gender ratio statistics for students and teachers are annually collected in the University. The computerized system of computing has been designed to get such statistics. The University has 51.78% boys and 48.22% girls with a faculty representing 33% females and 67% males.

6.3.6. Does the University conduct any gender sensitization programmes for its faculty?

IQAC conducts gender sensitization programmes. The UGC ASC conducts such programs on gender sensitization. There are various student clubs that provide workshops on this issue. Certain department also holds programmes on such areas.

6.3.7. What is the impact of the University's Academic Staff College Programmes in enhancing the competencies of the University faculty?

UGC, ASC at Lucknow is constantly organizing various programmes to enhance the competence of the faculty members. The following list shows the number of faculty undergone various training programmes.

6.4. Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1. What is the institutional mechanism available to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources?

The University has a Planning and Development Board, headed by a Director who is normally a experienced faculty. It decides for applying for funds to various schemes of different funding agencies. It also decides about the heads of expenditures of various funds under which it allocates the grants received. This Board decides about the allocation to different departments in accordance with their need and demand.

6.4.2. Does the University have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

The University has a fully fledged audit office where there is an internal auditor and internal audit is conducted. The University has external audit also from time to time. The University complies with all the state government rules in this regard.

6.4.3. Have the accounts been audited regularly? What were the audit objections, if any, and how were they complied with?

The University of Lucknow is a state University and is in full control of the state government. It has a finance officer appointed by the state government, and also have internal and external audits regularly.

6.4.5. Narrate the efforts taken by the University for Resource Mobilization.

The University has been mobilizing resources from various sources. The University gets its income from the fee of regular and SFC course. The University in addition gets grant from the State and central government. The

University also has some projects which support various few activities on the campus.

The University has a corpus fund.

- 6.5.1. Does the University conduct an academic audit of its departments? If yes, give details.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell, provides for conducting audit of the teaching departments, supporting services and administrative offices.

6.5.2. Based on the recommendations of the academic audit, what specific measures have been taken by the University to improve teaching, learning and evaluation?

The various measure suggested by the IQAC have ventured on inter networking of the departments in order to enhance the inter subject reach towards the students. The faculty is advised to introduce new pedagogy in learning. The planning and development boards is advised to allocate more funds for better delivery of teaching equipment.

6.5.3. Is there a central body within the University to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The academic council is the highest body in the University to continuously review the teaching and learning process. It is the apex statutory body and receives recommendations from the Faculty Board. The faculty board receives various academic minutes from the Departmental Committee. Hence there is a comprehensive representation about the continuous review of teaching and learning process in the institution.

6.5.4. How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

IQAC looks at the annual appraisal of the faculty. It looks at the issues of Information and communication. It has brought together the colleges and is sensitizing them on various issues like e- learning. The IQAC has created benchmarks as per NAAC recommendations.

6.5.5. How many decisions of the IQAC have been placed before the statutory authorities of the University for Implementation?

IQAC keeps on bringing issues to statutory authority from time to time.

6.5.6. Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

IQAC has external members on its board. Some of the important sections are

- 1. To create a toppers academy
- 2. SMS to students about new books
- 3. Instituting new books in various libraries.
- 6.5.7. Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

The University has an Equal Opportunities Cell which look at the disadvantaged sections of the society. The IQAC is constantly providing impetus to the needs of the cell.

6.5.8. What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centers, etc.?

There are specific review boards of the departments, and they have their own criterions for periodic reviews. Each subject area and research centers look after their own needs and cater to these needs as per their requirement.

Criterion VII Innovations and Best Practices

Archaeological Museum

The Department of Ancient Indian History and Archaeology, Lucknow University has an Archaeological Museum. This Museum serves as a very useful center in imparting the practical training to the students of Archaeology and Museology. The students are directly involved in the curatorial work and take active part in its educational and cultural events. The museum organizes lectures and talks of scholars of various fields from different part of the country. It has a good collection of terracotta antiquities, bone artifacts, Pre historic tools, plaster casts, models, coins, sculptures, manuscripts, palm leaves, potteries, seals and sealings. It has its own conservation laboratory and sufficient equipments for archaeological excavations /explorations.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1. Environment Consciousness

7.1.1. Does the University conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

The University is very conscious about the environment and has trained its botanical personnel about environmental issues. The University is going to have a Green Audit which is to be conducted every three years.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the University to make the campus ecofriendly?

- * Energy conservation: The University since its inception has created eco friendly buildings, which even during the hot summers keep the rooms very cool. Most of the new buildings have very wide windows which permit a lot of light in the rooms and keep the usage of electricity at the minimum. The University is low on carbon footprint. The University has restricted the use of automobiles on campus which promotes a green environment.
- * Use of renewable energy: As stated in the previous section the University takes into consideration natural lighting and hence increases the usage hence reduces the use of electrical energy. The University has a Masters programme in renewable energy which tires to bring new concept on the University Campus.
- * Water harvesting: The University ensures that most of the ground space is kept open and are not cemented. This ensures that rain water is harvested. The University is in the process of establishing new ways of water harvesting. The second campus of the University has water pits for water harvesting.
- * Check dam construction : Not Applicable
- * Efforts for Carbon neutrality: The University has restricted the movement of automobiles on campus.
- * **Plantation:** the University campuses are lush green and full of trees and plants. The University has conducted extensive plantation drives in the second campus.
- * Hazardous waste management: the University does note deals in any hazardous waste and hence has not devised any policy on the same.
- * E-waste management: the University has e-waste management drives conducted from time to time. These drives help in removing the obsolete e waste from time to time. The IQAC computer center and other departments organize workshops for sensitizing students and faculty regarding this issue.
- * Developing Eco consciousness: The IQAC and other department celebrate various days like earth day etc. to create awareness among the students and faculty members regarding environmental issues. The NCC and NSS organize rallies formation of human chain to create eco consciousness in the University as well as society.

Innovations

7.2.1. Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the University.

Leased Line: The University has got leased line commissioned through National Knowledge Network for providing internet facility to the campus.

Campus Networking: The University has undergone a networking of the whole campus. The departments and other offices are connected through internet facility.

INFLIBNET: The University has joined the INFLIBNET and through this facility the University is able to provide number of journals to the research scholars and faculty members in their laboratories/ chambers directly for their academic activities. The central library of the University also house a facility of 50 nodes for the user to get access of e resources available.

E-Governance through University's Website: The University displays its notices about the various activities on the website. The details of all the faculty, results of University of every course, admission notifications, administrative rules and regulations, tenders and notices are posted on the website. Various formats, seniority lists of faculty are also available on the website.

Hostel Networking and internet facility: All the hostels of the University have internet facilities for the students. Very soon they will be connected through University local area network.

Online Information Brochure: The University has all the information about the Masters and Bachelors programmes in two separate brochures on line. These have all the details about the various courses. The brochure has the number of seats and fee details. The ordinances regarding UG and PG admission are also available online.

Complete online process of admission: From the current academic session, the University has adopted new online system of admission for all the UG, PG course and this has led to a hassle free transparent admission process. The University has been able to reduce the expenditure incurred and involvement of human resource for this activity.

Computerized library: The library of the University is partially computerized and more than 50 nodes are available for the users to access e resources.

Virtual Classroom Facility at ASC and video conferencing: This facility has been created in the ASC for remote lecture delivery, discussions on subjects of common interest, interviews, etc. This facility also includes a studio for recording the lectures of renowned scholar.

NCC & NSS: These two wings of the University have been vibrantly active in past years and the activities organized for the students and the participation of the students reflect this fact. (Please refer to the previous part of the report). **Sanskritiki:** This body is responsible for the cultural activities and extracurricular activities of the students. It has been made broad based by integrating various activity clubs in it. Inclusion of more faculty members in organization of events has ensured the larger participation of especially female teachers and girl students.

LUAA: The Lucknow University Athletic Association (LUAA) is a vibrant body which has number of clubs for different sports. It has separate ladies club headed by female faculty member specially to encourage female student participation in the sports.

Camps and Adventurous Activities: The different departments organize educational tours and other activities for the students. NCC, NSS also organizes camps and adventure activities (please refer to the previous part of the report for details).

Book Fair: The library of the University organizes book fairs for the faculty members and students of the University. The University also facilitates the organization of national book fair in the campus by providing space and other infrastructure facility.

Exhibition of Research Papers and Books: The University also organize exhibition of research publication and books published by the faculty members of the University during convocation weak.

Grievance Boxes: The grievance boxes are available at Dean Offices and other places to assist students for lodging their grievances without disclosing their identity.

Capacity Building: frequent organization of seminars, conferences, corporate interactions, and guest lecturers has improved the University-Industry interface. This has resulted in increased exposure to new knowledge and skills in the emerging areas specific to different courses of study. Corporate interactions have enhanced dynamic thinking and idea generation.

- Faculty makes frequent use of electronic gadgets and other ICT tools in the classroom delivery thus replacing the traditional mode of teaching to the advantage of improved learning. There is now more deliberations through presentations, interactive sessions, quizzes and other extra-mural activities. These practices have greatly improved quality and overall learning environment.
- The quality of research at doctoral level has been improved by the introduction of entrance test and compulsory pre-registration course work.
- Association of experts from other specialized institutions with the Boards of Studies / Departmental Research Committees / Faculties / Academic Council has helped improve the social relevance of courses of study.
- Representation of members of different disadvantageous groups and setting up of a Equal Opportunity Cell has ensured equal opportunity for everyone.
- Each faculty member is required to fill up a Self Appraisal Form which reports the overall research work and other academic work done during a given academic session.
- Overall strengthening of infrastructure, raising of new teaching blocks to provide required space for expansion, purchase of needed equipments for laboratories, recruitment of new faculty, etc. have started showing results in terms of larger output and better quality research publications, more research projects awarded, and better placements of students.
- The greater element of autonomy given to the departments in their working has resulted in timely evaluation and declaration of examination results and improved student's satisfaction.

7.2. Best Practices

7.3.1. Give details of any two best practices which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the University.

FIRST BEST PRACTICE:

Title of the Practice: Transparent Academic processes (Admission, result Declaration etc) through ICT

Objectives: The University has used Information and communication technologies (ICT) for making admission and examination system efficient and transparent. ICT is also used to augment learning resources for advancement of learning, teaching, and research. The use of ICT is also helpful to enhance administrative efficiency and transparency.

Context: The powerful and potential tool of ICT has changed the face of the world. Use of ICT has enhanced access to knowledge resources exponentially, which otherwise was very limited earlier. It has also affected the pedagogy and knowledge delivery very effective and sharpened research techniques and therefore tremendously enhanced administrative efficiency and transparency.

Practice: The University considers ICT infrastructure as an important component, and is committed to ensure its equitable access to students, teachers and non-teaching staff for learning, teaching, research, and administrative activities. The University is augmenting its ICT infrastructure to match its growing academic and administrative needs. The University has used the ICT for the process of admission and examination. The admissions process is now totally online and anybody in the world, even the students sitting in remote places are now not required coming personally to complete the process. They can fill the form online and submit the fee even by internet. Then the merit list is displayed on the website and other formalities can be completed. The verification of various certificates is also online and this leads to a completely transparent and efficient system. Similarly the results preparation and their display on the website is also become very efficient and transparent by the use of ICT. Similarly the University is also using ICT resources for campus networking, E governance, virtual classroom etc.

Evidence of Success: The successful impact of ICT is quite clear from the timely declaration of results and online admission process this year. The online admission has drastically reduced the students rush on the campus. This transparent system has also ensured lesser number of admission related litigation as compared to previous years.

Use of ICT in classroom teaching in terms of effective knowledge delivery has also been very successful.

Problems & Resources: Shortage of manpower skilled in the use of the ICT and financial resources were the major constraints. Shortage of skilled manpower has been overcome by organizing training programmes in ICT by different University bodies. The University, over a period of time, has developed good ICT infrastructure out of its own funds and financial assistance provided by UGC and other funding agencies.

Second Best Practice:

Title of the practice- Participative Curriculum Development System-

Objectives of the Practice – The objective of this practice is to constantly upgrade the University curriculum and syllabus and keep it up to the mark with the latest trends in the subjects and need of applicability in the field.

The Context – The curriculum of any University is the best reflection of its academic strength. It has to be upgraded constantly and the components related to the applicability of knowledge on actual basis must be incorporated into it. It is only possible by the interactive participation of the various stakeholders.

The Practice - The University follows a well defined method of curriculum development. The University takes in to consideration the various stakeholders involved in receiving and imparting education as well as the society at large. The University interacts with the industry and the stakeholders in the working environment to assess the requirements of specialized courses. The courses take into consideration the inputs and are developed accordingly. The courses are updated on the same inputs. The above process is facilitated in addition to regulatory requirements as imposed by UGC and other bodies in the form of UGC Model Curriculums etc.

Evidence of Success – This particular practice of participatory development of curriculum has been very successful in evolving the syllabus of all the streams and keeps the University at par with the other top academic institutions. In addition to that the participation of external experts also keeps our faculty at par with level of knowledge and demand of the market. The change in the curriculum is initiated from the environmental inputs which assure that the curriculum is based on market demand. The various stakeholders that we involve are executives from the government, non government organizations, private sector, businessmen, social activists, alumni, students as well as courses instituted in other educational institutions. The syllabus of the University Courses are designed keeping in mind examinations like National Eligibility Test of UGC/ CSIR, SLET, JEST, GATE and other competitive examinations. This ensures employability of the students.


Innovation: The courses of the University are integrated with the industry and environment. The students are continuously involved in various forms of market programmes and practices and students alongwith teachers understand the latest needs of the employers. This helps in innovating new areas. Teachers are engaged in continuous innovative programmes.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required – Some time it is difficult to arrange participation of external members in the regular meetings of the statutory academic bodies due to lack of their availability. Financial constraints also sometime create difficulty to invite renowned experts. But the University overcome these problems by its own resources and the resources provided by other agencies and successfully continuing the practice of participatory curriculum development.

Section 1: Preface

Lucknow University, established in 1921, is one of the oldest universities of north India and occupies a prominent position in imparting higher education in this region. It is carved out of the Canning College. It came under the preview of Uttar Pradesh Universities Act in 1973. Starting with about 11 departments initially, the University has now 9 faculties, 34 P.G. Departments, 32 associated colleges, 3 constituent colleges (Medical college, Ayurvedic college and Fine Arts college), 10 P.G. training Centers and has recognised 4 Research Centres. The University is spread over two campuses of 165 acres of land (main campus of 90 acres and satellite campus of 75 acres). It is an urban University with its jurisdiction restricted to Lucknow city.

The University has statutory bodies like Executive Council, Academic Council, Finance Committee, Board of Studies and other statutory bodies. The administrative set up of the University consists of the Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Deans of Faculties, Proctor, Dean of Students Welfare, Registrar, Controller of Examinations, Finance Officer, Director of IPPR. Director Development and Planning Board, Superintendent of Works and Heads of Departments.

Over the years many teachers / students of this University have been honoured with decorations like; Padmavibhusan [2], Padmabhusan [4], Padmashri [17] S.S. Bhatnagar award, & Commonwealth awards and fellowships of other National and International organisations.

within an average span of 5-8 years. Approximates 10% to 20% of the members of the BOS are from outside the University. University takes ordinarily one year to introduce a new Programme / Course after it is conceptualized.

The self-financing courses have brought innovation in curriculum design and encouraged inter-disciplinary collaboration. Certain degree of academic flexibility with regard to course option exists. The programme option does not encourage horizontal mobility.

Criterion II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

Admission to the various programmes are done through counseling. Students to management, education and Law are admitted through special Entrance Tests. At the Under-graduate, level admission is done on the basis of academic records at the qualifying examination. Total number of working days of the university is 282 days and the total number of teaching days is 180-190. Ratio of teaching staff (375 permanent and 70 part time teachers) to non teaching staff (800) is nearly 1:2 and the ratio of students to teachers is very high. Over 85% of the faculties have at least one step higher qualification than the mandatory minimum level. 90% of the classes are taught by full time regular faculties. In self-financing courses bulk of the teaching is carried out by the guest faculty. The teaching and learning process in the class room is mostly traditional. More use of modern teaching techniques and computers in class room teaching is desirable.

The University conducts examination for over one-lack students and declares more than 180 results annually. For professional courses semester system of teaching and examination is followed. System of evaluation is primarily door evaluation by a single examiner. Occasionally central valuation is conducted. There is no provision for reevaluation. After a span of two decades, the

University was able to conduct academic programmes, examinations and declare the results in time. Question paper pattern needs improvement. Selection of examiners and paper setters is done on the recommendation of Board of Studies.

The teachers have been encouraged to attend seminar orientation and refresher courses. It may be beneficial to obtain feed back from students to improve teaching learning process.

The University has just introduced the Unit-Based curriculum by splitting the entire syllabus into units and asking the candidates to answer questions from each unit. Revaluation and re-examinations are not in vogue though retotaling of marks and Back paper provision exists.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy & Extension

The University has a strong research base. Approximately 90% of the faculty are actively involved in research. Four Departments are participating in COSSIST Program and 10 Departments are recognized as DSA / DRS / SAP Departments of UGC. Major research facilities established include in the areas of geology, economics, archeology, genetics, virology, plant nutrition, coordination chemistry, medicinal chemistry, lasers, macromolecular physics, solid state physics, optics, population and demographic research, development studies, marketing and fiscal management.

During the last 3 years teachers of the University have published more than 1452 research papers in national and internal journals (National-1186 &International-266). More than 75 teachers have received National / International awards & recognitions for their research works.

The total out-lay of the ongoing research projects undertaken by the teachers, mostly in science Departments exceeds Rs. 7 crores. These are funded by DST, CSIR, ICAR, UGC etc. Research is monitored by a separate Research Committee.

During the period from 1998-2000, 365 Ph.D degrees have been awarded. About 400 students are enrolled for Ph.D programme. University doesn't publicize the expertise of the faculties although there is a PRO. Hence consultancy has not been institutionalized though some teachers undertake consultancy assignments at individual level. There is no university-industry interaction centre. Recently, however the University has entered into an understanding with CII to publicize the expertise and infrastructural facilities available among the member industries, and to facilitate placement.

Much of the extension work is organized by the N.S.S., Dept of Social Work and the Departments of Education. N.S.S. undertakes community welfare programmes in the slums of Lucknow on issues like Environmental conservation, AIDS awareness, Literacy, Communal harmony, National integration, Hepatitis-B camps, etc. The University has also entered into an understanding with CII & Charities Aid Foundations (U.K) for ensuring a better teaching-learning environment in 154 Government Primary schools of Lucknow. The University has also an Adult Continuing Education Centre. Dept of Social Work has been recognized by the Social Welfare Board, New Delhi, as a Nodal Agency for identifying NGOs for funding and for monitoring the functioning and evaluation of the programmes of such NGOs. The Department is also entrusted with the responsibility of organizing Orientation training and Refresher programmes for family counselors in U.P.

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Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

University has two campuses, the main campus over an area of 90 acres and the satellite campus over an area of 75 acres of land. The University has good general facilities with several ancient buildings to accommodate various departments, library, central facilities, sports and physical education facilities. Besides UGC and State Government funding, University is also contemplating to increase its infrastructure from its own resources generated through self-financing programmes and donations. A Works Department headed by a Superintendent of works and supported by an Executive Engineer and supporting staff take care of the University infrastructure. The maintenance cost is primarily met by the University from its own resources besides the occasional maintenance grants received from the State Govt.

Central Library has a large collection of books i.e. 5.25 lacs, 10000 theses, & 4000 manuscripts & subscribes to nearly 398 journals annually. An Advisory Committee monitors functioning of the Library. The facilities available in the Central library are Inter—Library exchange of books, INFLIBNET, Book Bank, reprography, Computers, Internet, Audio & Video cassettes. Cooperative lending library with one lac books is also active. The Library opens from 9.00 AM to 5.00 PM.

Central computer center has above 80 computers with various software packages, multimedia facility and training facility for Undergraduate students. They also conduct PG diploma course. The Centre is opens from 9.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. In addition there are around 250 computers available in the departments.

The University Health Centre provides both Allopathic as well as Homeopathic treatments. The health centre has 5 doctors with adequate

paramedical staff. Adequate health care facilities are provided to the employees. The facilities for Naturopathy and Yoga are also made available to the employees and students.

In sports and physical education, the infrastructural facilities available are a gymnasium, playgrounds and kits for Cricket, Lawn tennis, Badminton, Football, Hockey, Volley ball and Basket ball. Other facilities are swimming, cycling & rowing. Sports are encouraged by giving incentive to students who represent the University in National & International events. Students participating in International events are given direct admission. Due weightage is given to participants of national events. Last Year University bagged 1 gold, 3 silver & 3 bronzes at the National level.

The University has 10 boys' hostels & 2 girls' hostels to accommodate nearly 2500 students. Hostels are provided with facilities like hostel library, T.V., phone. The other activities in the hostels include reading room, indoor & outdoor games, conduct of competitions, cultural functions etc.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The University has an enrollment of nearly 30,000 students in its programmes. Students are mostly from within the state of Uttar Pradesh. A fairly good number of foreign students and NRI students study in the University.

The dropout rate is between 8% to 11% at UG and between 8% to 10% at PG level. Similarly the success rate is 80% in UG and 85% in PG classes. The rate of first class passing out of the University is 11% at UG level and 9% at PG level.

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The University has distinguished alumni who have brought laurels. Good number of alumni are in ONGC at Dehraudun where they have an alumni association. University is trying to strengthen the alumni association in a more coordinated and effective manner.

Students are provided with financial aid from Central Govt., State Govt. and other scholarships such as Bursary scholarships, Alpasankhyak loan scholarships, and scholarships instituted through endowments. Last year about 3200 students were provided with financial aids. University has an Information and employment guidance bureau providing information to students on various scholarships, competitive examinations and placement opportunities.

At the time of admission concerned Faculties conduct academic counseling of the students. Counseling goes on through out the year. To promote career and personality development, the University has entered into an understanding with HLS (Human Learning Systems) India, which conducts career counseling and personality development workshops for the students. It is noteworthy that HLS India conducts such workshops free of cost as an "Alumni contribution" to the University.

Criterion VI: Organisation and Management

The University is managed as per the U.P. Universities Act and Statute. The organizational structure is Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Executive Council, The Court & Academic council. Other supporting bodies are Finance committee, Development Planning Board, Proctorial Board, Admission Committee, Examination Committee.

For efficient functioning, University has introduced automation in admission, Library. Examination and some segments of administration. Administration is

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regulated as per the Act and the Statutes. Reservation policy is strictly followed. Confidential report of the administrative staff is maintained. Six cases of violation of code of conduct were recorded during the last three years.

Besides the usual state Govt. & Central Government grants (UGC) the University generates large sums from its self-financing courses (13.63 crores) and donations (14.90 lacs). Interest accrued from research projects (11.22 crores) is an additional grant generated by the University. University efforts to revise the fees in consultation with the students and Students' Union effecting an increase of fees by 300 to 500% is a welcome step towards augmenting the revenue of the institution. There is an internal audit mechanism.



ORDINANCE FOR POSTGRADUATE ADMISSION

1 IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS

- 1.1 The instructions related to the online admissions are given here, which are authorized under the Act, Ordinances, Rules & Regulations of the University.
- 1.2 Gap Certificate: If there is gap in taking admission after graduation/qualifying examination, then a certificate by the Notary on Rs. 10.00 Stamp paper has to be submitted at the time of admission.
- 1.3 If you want benefit of reservation or zero fees, then give the details of the related certificates during the filling of the Online application form. No candidate will get the permission for any change in weightage or reservation after the form is submitted.
- 1.4 The detailed information of the admission procedure will be displayed on the University website. Candidates are advised to check for updates regularly on the University website.
- 1.5 After declaration of the merit list a copy of the list will be displayed on the University website. The candidate himself/herself will find his/her merit number from the merit list. The merit list will not be published in the newspaper.
- 1.6 The Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes candidates originally belonging to Uttar Pradesh will be given the benefit of reservation. Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes candidates of other states will be treated as general.
- 1.7 All fees deposited at the time of registration will not be refunded under any circumstances.
- 1.8 As directed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court, action will be taken against the students who indulge in incidence like ragging during studentship.
- 1.9 Those candidates who have been expelled from any college/institution or found guilty under Indian Penal Code are not eligible to apply for any course in the University of Lucknow.
- 1.10 Reservation and income certificates shall be verified on internet.

2 Eligibility Rules for Admission in the Faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce and Education to the M.Phil./Post-Graduate Courses (except Professional Courses)

- A candidate will be eligible for Admission to Postgraduate Courses if he/she has completed B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. with 10+2+3 system from any University recognized by University Grants Commission and has secured a minimum 45% of marks at graduate level. However for SC/ST candidates minimum pass percentage of marks will be 40%. For admission to LL.M. the minimum requirement is 50%(48% for SC/ST) in LL.B. examination.
- 2.2 The admission to the Post-Graduate Courses in the faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce and Education shall be on the basis of merit of marks obtained in the Graduation/Qualifying Examination.
- 2.3 The percentage shall be calculated upto three figures after decimal point.
- 2.4 Candidate shall be entitled to weightage (if any) on the merit index.
- 2.5 Of the total number of seats in any subject, 80% candidates passing the graduate/qualifying examination from the Lucknow University shall be admitted.

- 2.6 For the remaining 20% seats, graduates from the Universities other than Lucknow University shall be admitted, provided that the merit of the candidates of other Universities is not below the merit of the last candidate admitted from Lucknow University. The seats remaining vacant under category (6), shall also be filled up with the graduate of Lucknow University in order of merit index. The candidate who after passing his/her LL.B. examination from the other University, has been pursuing any other course in Lucknow University shall not be treated as graduate of Lucknow University for admission in LL.M.
- 2.7 In case where number of available seats is less and candidates secure same marks (percent) at the graduate/qualifying level examination, the admission of the candidate will be based upon securing higher marks in the relevant subject of the final year of the qualifying examination.
- A candidate's choice of the subject in M.A./M.Sc./M.Com. shall be restricted to one of the subjects taken in the part-III examination for the Bachelor's Degree.
- 2.9 In the Faculty of Arts the requirement of subject of study at graduate level for admission to various subjects (except Mathematics and Statistics) shall stand waived off in case of candidate having obtained 55% or more marks at qualifying examination. Admission of such candidates in any subject shall not exceed 10% of the total number of seats. The graduate of the Faculty of Arts will be eligible for admission to M.A. I in Mathematics and Statistics. Science Graduates shall not be eligible for admission to M.A. I in Mathematics and Statistics.
- 2.10 Those candidates who have passed the graduate degree examination of this University and passed their Part I or Part II Examination from other Universities, their merit shall be prepared on the basis of marks obtained in the BA part III/qualifying examination of Lucknow University.
- 2.11 A candidate can not pursue two Postgraduate courses simultaneously.
- 2.12 A candidate who has already completed Postgraduate course in one subject will not be eligible for the second Postgraduate course except professional course.
- 2.13 Final Merit list shall be available in the concerned Departments and same will be available on the University website.
- 2.14 University reserves the right to cancel any admission at any stage.
- 2.15 In case of any matter relating to the Postgraduate Admissions, the decision of the Vice-Chancellor/Admission Committee, Lucknow University shall be final.
- 2.16 All the legal matters pertaining to the Postgraduate Admissions shall be subject to the Lucknow Jurisdiction only.
- 2.17 If the number of applications for a **SELF FINANCING COURSE** is less that 40% of the number of seats, the admission to that program will not be done for this academic year In this situation the Application Fees will not be refunded.
- 2.18 The Fees of different courses will be displayed while declaring the final Admission List on the University website.

ORDINANCE FOR UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSION

IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS

- 1.1 The instructions related to the online admissions are given here, which are authorized under the Act, Ordinances, Rules & Regulations of the University.
- 1.2 Gap Certificate: If there is gap in taking admission after Intermediate, then a certificate by the Notary on Rs. 10.00 Stamp paper has to be submitted at the time of admission.
- 1.3 If you want benefit of reservation or zero fees, then give the details of the related certificates during the filling of the Online application form. No candidate will get the permission for any change in weightage or reservation after the form is submitted.
- 1.4 The detailed information of the admission procedure will be displayed on the University website. Candidates are advised to check for updates regularly on the University website.
- 1.5 After declaration of the merit list a copy of the list will be displayed on the University website. The candidate himself/herself will find his/her merit number from the merit list. The merit list will not be published in the newspaper.
- 1.6 The Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes candidates originally belonging to Uttar Pradesh will be given the benefit of reservation. Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes candidates of other states will be treated as general.
- 1.7 All fees deposited at the time of registration will not be refunded under any circumstances.
- 1.8 As directed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court, action will be taken against the students who indulge in incidence like ragging during studentship.
- 1.9 Reservation and income certificates shall be verified on internet.

2 GENERAL INFORMATIONS

- 2.1 The University reserves the right to change or amend the admission rules at any time without prior notification.
- 2.2 If any candidate gets admission on the basis of false information/improper means or on the basis of false marksheet his/her admission will be treated cancelled from the beginning and legal action will be taken against him/her under IPC.
- 2.3 Order of Merit will be determined as follows:-
- 2.3.1 In the Faculties of Arts, Commerce Law, and Science, Under Graduate students for the Session 2013-14 shall be admitted on the basis of marks obtained in the qualifying examinations.

- 2.3.2 In order to remove disparity that exists between the marks awarded to the candidates by different examining authorities/boards in the country, a system of "Normalization" will be adopted. Under the normalization procedure statistically the first rank student of one board will be equal to that of the first rank of the other board. As such the first rank student of each board will be considered to have obtained 100% marks and the aggregate marks of all other students from that board will be normalized with reference to the aggregate marks obtained by the first rank student of the board. For example, if the aggregate marks of the first rank student of a board is 94%, his normalized aggregate is 100% and if a student from the same board has obtained 88% marks, then his normalized percentage will be (88x100)/94=93.61%. The University shall procure on its own the percentage of marks obtained by first rank student of the Central Board of Secondary Education, Council of Indian School Certificate and U.P. Board. All other Boards will be treated at par with I.S.C. for the purpose of normalization of marks.
- 2.3.3 The percentage shall be calculated up to three figures after decimal point.
- 2.4 If two or more candidates have secured equivalent marks/rank in the merit Index, then the merit for admission will be determined as follows:-
- 2.4.1 If the Intermediate marks are same in such cases first preference will be given to the candidate who secures higher percentage of marks at High School or equivalent examination.
- 2.4.2 If the marks obtained at the Intermediate and High School or equivalent examination are the same, then in that case the older candidate will be given priority.
- 2.5 The candidate shall be entitled to weightages (if any) on the merit.
- 2.6 The reservation shall be given as permissible under the Uttar Pradesh Government / University Rules.
- 2.7 In case of students seeking admission to the Faculty of Law, he/she shall not be allowed to simultaneously register for a Law degree program with any other graduate or post graduate degree/diploma or even a certificate course run by the University of Lucknow or any other University or an Institute for academic or professional learning.
- 2.8 University reserves the right to cancel any admission at any stage.
- 2.9 If the candidate has passed out from Hindi Sahitya Sammelan, Prayag, Allahabad or Nadwa College, Lucknow and has not passed Intermediate with English language then he/she will not be eligible for admission.
- 2.10 All foreign students seeking admission in the University are compulsorily required to have knowledge of Hindi or English language. Medium of study in University is Hindi and English.
- 2.11 Weightage: The final merit of the candidates bearing the Outstanding sports person/ N.C.C "B" certificate will be determined in the merit list by adding 5% of the total marks obtained by him/her in the combined merit.
- 2.12 For admission to the Faculty of Law
- 2.12.1 For admission to L.L.B. (Hons.) course, the candidates belonging to the General category and OBC should not be above 20 years of age as on 1st July of the year of the admission. However SC/ST candidates should not be above 22 years of age.
- 2.12.2 For the students taking admission to the L.L.B. (Hons.) course there shall be no lateral entry on the plea of graduation in any subject or exit by way of awarding a degree splitting the course at any intermediary stage of the course.
- 2.12.3 The relevant UGC/BCI rules (as amended from time to time) shall be binding.

- 2.13 All disputes regarding interpretation of provision of Ordinance related to the admission shall be referred to the Vice-Chancellor/Admission Committee of University of Lucknow and whose decision shall be final.
- 2.14 All the legal matters pertaining to the admission shall be subject to Lucknow Judicature only.

Note 2. For getting sports and handicapped weightage/ reservation, candidate will have to be present before the sports/medical board. The candidate, who does not appear before these boards, will not be provided the sports and handicapped weightage/ reservation for admission and his/her admission form will be considered as of general category.

Annexure - 9

Constitution of the Lucknow University Student Union

RULES:

- 1. **Name and Objects: -** The Union shall be called the Lucknow University Student Union (LUSU). Constitution of the Lucknow University Student Union shall be applicable to the Lucknow University only; Associate colleges should get their own Constitution drafted for student bodies.
- 2. The Objects of the Union shall be
 - (a) to promote the corporate, social and intellectual life of the students;
 - (b) to inculcate democratic traditions among students; and
 - (c) in general, to look after their welfare and interest.
- 3. The above mentioned objects shall be secured by
 - (a)holding debates, discussions on social and political problem of the day, symposia, declamations, contests, organizing lectures of general interest, study circles, arranging exhibitions and holding social gatherings;
 - (b)maintaining a Library, a Reading Room and a Refreshment Room;
 - (c) organizing indoor games, and providing other amenities of a club;
 - (d)initiating and organizing self-help and social service activities; and
 - (e) making representation to the authorities of the University on any matter affecting the welfare and interest of students.
- 4. (i) **Membership:** The members of the Union shall be
 - (a) Ordinary members
- (b) Associate members
- (c) Honorary members
- (d) Life members
- (ii) Every student enrolled in the faculties of *Arts, Commerce, Education, Fine Arts, Law, Science and Institute of Management Sciences*, except those belonging to the associated colleges, shall be an ordinary member of the Union and shall pay Rs.75/- per session as membership fee which shall be collected along with his University fees. Accordingly, students of the associated colleges shall not be members of the Lucknow University Student Union.
- (iii) Associate members shall be such other persons connected with the University; the Council shall deem fit to invite through its President, with the previous sanction of the Patron.
- (iv) Honorary members shall be such other persons of public who may from time to time be elected by the members at a special private business meeting on the recommendation of the Patron and the Council. The invitation to become an honorary member shall be sent by the Patron on behalf of the Union.
- (v) Life members shall be those ordinary members who have kept up their membership continuously for two years, provided they have ceased to be students of the University and thereafter pay a sum of Rs. 500/-.

- (vi) At all elections only ordinary members shall exercise the right to vote.
- 5. **General Body**: The ordinary members of the Union shall constitute the General Body of the Union. The General Body shall be the supreme governing body of the Union.
- 6. **The Council:** There shall be a Council of the Union consisting of not more than 50 members as following:
- (i) The officers of the Union as provided in clause (i) of Rule 8(B) other than (a), (d) and (f).
- (iii) Ten representatives of the students from Boys' Halls/Hostels consisting of not more than one representative from each Hall/Hostel who are members of the Union to be elected by the said students from amongst such of themselves as fulfill the Qualifications laid down in Rule 7, by secret ballot.
- (iii) Five representatives of the female students from Girls' Halls/Hostels consisting of not more than one representative from each Hall/Hostel who are members of the Union to be elected by the said students from amongst such of themselves as fulfill the qualifications laid down in Rule 7 by secret ballot.
- (iv) One representative from Delegacies to be elected by the students who are members of the Union and are enrolled as members of the Delegacy from amongst such of themselves as fulfill the qualifications laid down in Rule 7 by secret ballot.
- (v) Sixteen representatives of the students who are members of the Union and fulfill the qualifications laid down in Rule 7, to be nominated by the Patron in such manner that
 - (a) Three of the said students are members of the Other Backward Classes:
 - (b) two of the said students are members of the Scheduled Caste or Scheduled Tribe;
 - (c) Five of the said students are women;
 - (d) Five of the said students are meritorious;
 - (e) One of the said students is an outstanding sports person.
- (vi) Fourteen representatives of the students who are members of the Union and fulfill the qualifications laid down in Rule 7 shall be elected by the students of their respective faculties in such manner that
 - (a) four of the said representatives shall be from Faculty of Arts;
 - (b) three of the said representatives shall be from the Faculty of Science:
 - (c) two of the said representatives shall be from Faculty of Law;
 - (d) two of the said representatives shall be from the Faculty of Commerce:
 - (e) one of the said representative shall be from the Faculty of Education:
 - (f) one of the said representative shall be from Faculty of Fine Arts;
 - (g) one of the said representatives shall be from Institute of Management Sciences.

- 7. A member of the Union shall be entitled to be elected or nominated as member of the Executive Committee or the Council.
 - (a) Such student is on the regular rolls of the University on the date of submitting his nomination form for the election and on the date of his election or on the date of his nomination to the Executive Committee or the Council, as the case may be and is, on the date or dates in question.
 - (b) In the case of elections to the offices of President, Vice-President, General Secretary and Junior Librarian, such student has not held the same post earlier.
- 8(A). Pursuant to the order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court dated 02 December, 2005 the Ministry of Human Resource Development had constituted a committee under Shri I. M. Lyngdoh (former Chief Election Commissioner) to examine and recommend upon certain aspects of the student body and student union election conducted in universities and colleges and other institutions of higher education across India. The committee submitted its report on 26 May, 2006. The Hon'ble Supreme Court in its order dated 22 September, 2006 directed that the recommendations of the

Committee be implemented and followed in all Colleges/University elections to be held hereafter. Government of Uttar Pradesh through its order No. 1995/70-1-2007-15(12)(1)/94 dated 07-09-07 had directed all state universities not to conduct student union elections till further notice so as to improve academic atmosphere and regularize sessions in campuses. Government of Uttar Pradesh through its order No. CM-08/70-1-2012 dated 21 March, 2012 has directed all state universities to inculcate directions of the government at appropriate places in the ordinances of the universities for conduct of student union elections from 2012-13 session according to Lyngdoh Committee recommendations. Executive Council of the University of Lucknow discussed Government order No. CM-08/70-1-2012 dated 21 March, 2012 and passed the Lucknow University Student Union Constitution with amendments through its resolution on agenda item no.10 in the meeting held on 19 July, 2012. Recommendations of the Lyngdoh Committee and Government Order have been incorporated in the Student Union Constitution in Clause 8(B) sub clauses (iv) to (xxx).

- 8(B). The following shall be the officers and members of the Student Union:
- (i) (a) The Patron (b) The President (c) The Vice-President (d) Treasurer (e) The Secretary (f) The Senior Librarian, and
 - (g) The Junior Librarian
- (ii) Officers of (b), (c), (e) and (g) of the preceding clause shall be elected directly by the ordinary members of the Union. Provided that the candidates for (g) must be Post-graduate students.
- (iii) The General elections shall be conducted in each academic session by the Senior Librarian who shall be the Returning Officer and in his absence by some teacher appointed by the Vice-Chancellor.

- (iv) The candidate shall have one opportunity to contest for the post of office bearer, and two opportunities to contest for the post of an executive member. Any student who has held any of these four offices (b), (c) (e) and (g) of clause (i) shall not be eligible for re-election to any of these posts of office bearer.
- (v) Students Union Elections shall be held by direct secret ballot. Officials of students union shall be directly elected through secret votes by ordinary members of the Union.
- (vi) During the period of the elections no person, who is not a student on the rolls of the University, shall be permitted to take part in the election process in any capacity.
- (vii) Duration of the Election Process: The entire process of elections, commencing from thedate of filing of nomination papers to the date of declaration of results, including the campaign period, should not exceed 10 days.
- (viii) Frequency and Time of the Election Process: Elections should be held on a yearly basis and that the same should be held between 6 to 8 weeks from the date of commencement of the academic session i.e. from the first day of commencement of classes for all students of the University.
- (ix) Eligibility Criteria for Candidates
 - a. Under graduate students between the ages of 17 and 22 years may contest elections.
 - b. For Post Graduate Students the maximum age limit to contest an election would be 25 years,
 - c. For research students the maximum age limit to contest an election would be 28 years.
 - d. Permissible age limit to contest elections prescribed above in 9 (a), (b) and (c) shall be calculated as on the date of nomination for election.
- (x) The candidate should have attained the minimum percentage of attendance as prescribed by the University or 75% attendance, whichever is higher.
- (xi) The candidate must not have any academic arrears in the year of contesting election.
- (xii) The candidate shall not have a previous criminal record, that is to say she/he should not have been tried and/or convicted of any criminal offense or misdemeanor. The candidate shall also not have been subject to any disciplinary action by the University authorities.
- (xiii) The candidate must be a regular, full time student of the University and should not be a distance/proximate education student. That is to say that all eligible candidates must be enrolled in a full time course, the course duration being at least one year.
- (xiv) Election-related Expenditure and Financial Accountability:
- (a) The maximum permitted election expenditure per candidate shall be Rs.5000/-.
- (b) Each candidate shall, within two weeks of the declaration of the result, submit complete and audited accounts to the University authorities. The University shall publish such audited accounts, within 2 days of the

- submission of such accounts, through a suitable medium so that any member of the student body may freely examine the same.
- (c) If, on a complaint being made, it is proved that a candidate has spent more than five thousand rupees as his election expenses; then such an election, if declared will be treated as invalid.
- (d) The election of the candidate will be nullified in the event of any noncompliance or in the event of any excessive expenditure.
- (xv) No candidate shall indulge in, nor shall abet, any activity, which may aggravate existing differences or create mutual hatred or cause tension between different castes and communities, religious or linguistic, or between any group(s) of students.
- (xvi) Criticism of other candidates, when made, shall be confined to their policies and programs, past record and work. Candidates shall refrain from criticism of all aspects of private life, not connected with the public activities of the other candidates or supporters of such other candidates. Criticism of other candidates, or their supporters based on unverified allegations or distortion shall be avoided.
- (xvii) There shall be no appeal to caste or communal feelings for securing votes. Places of worship, within or outside the campus shall not be used for election propaganda.
- (xviii) All candidates shall be prohibited from indulging or abetting, all activities which are considered to be "corrupt practices" and offences, such as bribing of voters, intimidation of voters, impersonation of voters, canvassing or use of propaganda within 100 meters of polling stations, holding public meetings during the period of 24 hours ending with the hour fixed with the close of the poll, and the transport and conveyance of voters to and from polling stations.
- (xix) No candidate shall be permitted to make use of printed posters, printed pamphlets, or any other printed material for the purpose of canvassing. Candidates may only utilize hand-made posters for the purpose of canvassing, provided that such hand-made posters are procured within the expenditure limit set out herein above.
- (xx) Candidates may only utilize hand-made posters at certain places in the campus, which shall be notified in advance by the University authority.
- (xxi) No candidate shall be permitted to carry out processions, or public meetings, or in *any* way canvass or distribute propaganda items outside the University campus.
- (xxii) No candidate shall, nor shall her/his supporters, deface or cause any destruction to any property of the University campus, for any purpose whatsoever, without the prior written permission of the University authorities. All candidates shall be held jointly and severally liable for any destruction / defacing of any University property.
- (xxiii) During the election period the candidates may hold processions and/or public meetings, provided that such processions and/or public meetings do not, in any manner, disturb the classes and other academic and co-curricular activities of the college / University. Further, such procession

/public meeting may not be held without the prior written permission of the University authority.

- (xxiv) On the day of polling, student organizations and candidates shall
 - a. co-operate with the officers on election duty to ensure peaceful and orderly polling and complete freedom to the voters to exercise their franchise without being subjected to any annoyance or obstruction:
 - b. not serve or distribute any eatables, or other solid and liquid consumables, except water on polling day;
 - c. not hand out any propaganda item on the polling day.
- (xxv) The use of loudspeakers, vehicles and animals for the purpose of canvassing shall be prohibited.
- (xxvi) Excepting the voters, no one without a valid pass/letter of authority from the election commission or from the University authorities shall enter the polling booths.
- (xxvii) The election commission/University shall appoint impartial observers. If the candidates have any specific complaint or problem regarding the conduct of the elections they may bring the same to the notice of the observer.
- (xxviii)All candidates shall be jointly responsible for ensuring the cleaning up of the polling area within 48 hours of the conclusion of polling.
- (xxix)Any contravention of any of the above recommendations may make the candidate liable to be stripped of his candidature, or his elected post, as the case may be.
 - The election commission/University authorities may also take appropriate disciplinary action against such a violator.
- (xxx) In addition to the above-mentioned code of conduct, it is also recommended that certain provisions of Indian Penal Code, 1860 (Section 153A and Chapter IXA- "Offences Relating to Elections"), may also be made applicable to student elections.
- 9. The Executive Committee of the Union shall consist of the following:
 - (a) the officers of the Union as provided in clause (i) of Rule 8(B).
 - (b) one representative each of the students belonging to the scheduled castes or scheduled tribes and the Other Backward Classes and one female student, to be elected by the members of the Council from amongst themselves by secret ballot.
 - (c) one of the members nominated to the Council as meritorious student to be elected by the members of the Council from amongst themselves by the secret ballot.
 - (d)the president of the preceding session, provided she/he remains a student of the University, shall be ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.
 - The Executive Committee shall be the executive authority of the Union. It shall be responsible to the Council.

10. Powers and duties and period of officers - members of Union

- (a) Every ordinary member shall have the right to vote at the elections of the Executive and the Council and at all meetings where vote is called for, except where election is indirect;
- (b) Subject to Rule 8 (B) clause (iii), every ordinary member of the Union shall have the right to contest election for the Executive and the Council;
- (c) Every member shall have the right to examine the accounts, the minute books and the records of the Union, provided that she/he gives three days notice of his intention to do so to the Secretary;
- (d) Every member shall have the right to ask question in writing on any matter connected with the Union and to receive a reply from the Executive Committee. All such questions shall be addressed to the Secretary.

11. The Council:

- (a) The Council shall function till the end of the academic session;
- (b) It shall consider and pass the budget of the year as presented by the Executive Committee;
- (c) It shall have power to make bye-laws to regulate symposia, declamations and study circles.

12. **Executive Committee:**

- (a) The Executive Committee shall remain in office till the end of the University academic session;
- (b) Besides the duties assigned in the constitution, it shall have the power to allot different duties to its members;
- (c) It shall prepare the Budget and place it before the Council for approval and subsequently before the General Body for ratification;
- (d) In case a member of the executive misbehaves or neglects his duties, it shall call for an explanation and on receipt of such explanation, if it deems necessary, shall warn the member concerned by a resolution;
- (e) In case a member of the executive is alleged to have committed a breach of the constitution or is charged with a serious offence such as defalcation of funds or misappropriation of the Union property, it shall after investigation and with its own findings and opinion forward the case to the Patron for such action as she/he may deem fit. The member so accused shall be given full opportunity to defend himself.

13. **Patron:**

- (a) The Vice Chancellor of the University shall be the Patron.
- (b) The patron may preside at the meetings of the General Body on special occasions at the request of the Executive Committee.
- (c) The Patron shall have power to see that no action of the Union interferes with the maintenance of discipline in the University and his decision in this connection shall be final. The Patron shall have the power to call for report from any other officer of the Union. The proceedings of the Executive Committee, the Council and the General Body of the Union shall be regularly sent to the Patron as soon as possible. In all cases of interpretation of these rules the decision of the Patron shall be final.

14. **President**:

- (a) The President shall be the Executive Head of the Union and shall preside over all the meetings of the Union except those otherwise specified in this constitution. At a meeting at which lectures are delivered she/he may request a member of the teaching staff or a member of the Executive Committee to preside. She/He shall be the Chairman of the Council and the Executive Committee. She/He shall decide points of order raised at the meeting and his decision thereon shall be final;
- (b) She/He shall prepare the annual report of the Union which after adoption by the Executive shall be submitted to the General Body on its behalf.
- (c) She/He may spend a sum not exceeding Rs. 1000/- in any month in case of emergency. She/He shall submit an account the money so spent by him to the Executive at its next meeting for approval;
- (d) In case of emergency she/he may call a meeting of the Executive Committee, the Council and the General Body.

15. Vice-President:

(a) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall preside at the meetings; (b) The Vice-President shall carry out the duties of the President when the latter is absent.

16. **Treasurer**:

- (a) The Treasurer shall be a member of the teaching staff and shall be nominated by the
 - Patron. She/He shall hold office at the pleasure of the Patron;
- (b) She/He shall prepare the budget and place it before the Executive;
- (c) She/He shall see that the funds are spent properly according to the budget and in accord with any resolutions passed by the Executive Committee or the Council or the General Body. She/He shall countersign all indents for articles costing Rs. 100/- or more. She/He shall make the necessary disbursements directly after receiving a certificate from the Secretary to the effect that the articles mentioned in the bill have been
 - Secretary to the effect that the articles mentioned in the bill have been duly received;
- (d) She/He shall draw and sign cheques drawn on the Union's accounts;
- (e) She/He shall prepare the annual balance-sheet and hand over the same to the President.

17. **Secretary**:

- (a) The Secretary shall call and attend meeting of the Executive Committee, the Council and the General Body in consultation with the President.
- (b) She/He shall keep the minutes of such meeting and shall present them for confirmation at the next meeting of a similar kind.
- (c) She/He shall sign on behalf of the Union all documents except drafts and cheques issued by the Treasurer.
- (d)She/He shall conduct the correspondence of the Union and shall give information concerning meetings to the members of the Onion.

- (e) She/He shall keep all the records of the Union, other than those kept by the Treasurer and the Librarian.
- (f) She/He shall keep the detailed account of the funds.
- (g)She/He shall supervise the work of the office.
- (h)She/He shall arrange for the purchase of requisites for the Union.
- (i) She/He is empowered to spend a sum not exceeding Rs.500/- in any month in case of emergency. She/He shall submit account of the money so spent by him to the Executive Committee for approval at its next meeting.
- (j) She/He shall keep the President informed of all matters.

18. Senior Librarian:

- (a) The Senior Librarian shall be member of the teaching staff and shall be nominated by the Patron. She/He shall hold office at the pleasure of the Patron.
- (b) She/He shall exercise general supervision over matters pertaining to the Union Library and Reading Room and the use of the Union Building.
- (c) She/He shall conduct all elections in accordance with the Rules.
- (d)At the end of every academic session she/he will receive charge of the offices of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and the Junior Librarian.

19. **Junior Librarian:**

The Junior Librarian shall carry on the work of the Union Library and Reading Room in accordance with the directions given by the Executive Committee (subject to general supervision of the Senior Librarian).

20. Assistant Secretary:

- (a) The Secretary may, with the approval of the Executive Committee nominate an Assistant Secretary from among the members of the Council to help in her/his duties, but the Assistant Secretary need not necessarily be a member of the Executive Committee. She/He shall hold office at the pleasure of the Executive Committee.
- (b) She/He shall have the right to be present at all meetings of the Executive Committee and the Council.

21. **Meetings: General Body**

Meetings of the General Body of the Union shall be of the three kinds:

(a)Private

business

meetings;

(b) Meetings for

debates; and

- (c) Meetings
- for lectures.
- 22. (a) Private business meetings shall deal with the affairs of the Union. At private business meetings no non-member shall be allowed to be present. There shall be at least one private business meeting for each term. One hundred members shall form the quorum of such meeting.
 - (a) Ordinary debate meetings will be held every fortnight as far as possible;

- (b) At least one prize debate will be held in each term;
- (c) The Executive Committee may, with the approval of the Patron, invite non-members to speak at a debate of the Union.
- 23. At meetings for debates and lectures non-members may be allowed to be present.
- 24. No quorum is required in (a) debate meetings; (b)meetings for lectures; and (c)adjourned meetings for want of quorum.

25. The Council:

Meetings of the Council may be held whenever necessary. The Secretary shall call these meetings in consultation with or on the direction of the Patron, the President or the Executive Committee, or at the requisition of 12 members of the Council. Twelve members shall form the quorum. There shall be a meeting of the Council once a term. At least three days notice shall be given to the members for a meeting.

26. Executive Committee:

A meeting of the Executive Committee may be held whenever necessary. The Secretary shall call the meeting in consultation with or on the direction of the Patron or the President, or on the requisition of seven members of the Executive Committee. Seven members shall form the quorum. There shall be a meeting of the Executive Committee once every month. At least two days notice shall be given to the members.

27. Emergent Meetings:

- (a) An emergent meeting of the General Body may be called at the direction of the Patron, the President or the Executive Committee. At least six days notice shall be given for such a meeting.
- (b) An emergent meeting of the Council may be called at the direction of the Patron, the President or the Executive Committee. At least two days notice shall be given for such a meeting.
- (c) An emergent meeting of the Executive Committee may be called at the direction of the Patron, or the President. At least one day notice shall be given for such a meeting.
- 28. At the emergent meeting of the General Body or the Council or the Executive Committee, no business other than that for the consideration of which the meeting has been convened shall be considered.
- 29. In this constitution, "term" means any of the following periods:
 - (a) from the first day of the session to the beginning of the Vijayadashmi vacation;
 - (b) from the end of the Vijayadashmi vacation to the beginning of the Christmas vacation; and
 - (c) from the end of the Christmas vacation to the end of the session.
- 30. **Union funds and property**: The Union premises will be at the disposal of the authorities of the Union for the purpose of the Union as defined in this constitution and shall not be used for any other purposes except with the previous permission of the Vice Chancellor.

- 31. (a) The Executive Committee shall prepare the budget and send the same to the Council for consideration and approval. It shall be finally sent to the General Body for ratification.
 - (b) A private business meeting of the General Body to ratify the budget of the year will be held within one month from the oath taking date of student union.
 - (c) The Council may propose changes in the budget. The changes made by the Council shall be placed before the Executive Committee which shall reconsider the budget. In case of difference of opinion between the Council and the Executive Committee the original draft of the budget as prepared by the Executive Committee shall be presented at the meeting of the General Body along with the changes proposed by the Council. The General Body shall be the final authority in regard to the passing of the budget.
- 32. Out of the Union fee of Rs. 75/- per annum payment at the rates and for the purposes mentioned below shall be made:
 - (a)Rs. 14/- per student shall be spent for the conduct of all union elections connected to LUSU;
 - (b)Rs. 12/- per student shall be made available to the various departmental associations on the basis of their respective strengths;
 - (c)Rs. 12/- per student shall be made available to the Lucknow University dispensary; (d) Rs. 12/- per student shall be made available to the Athletic Association.
- 33. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to spend up to 3% of the total income of the Union at its own discretion, provided such expenditure has not already been disapproved by the General Body. This amount shall be shown in the budget under the Head Union Executive Contingency Fund.
- 34. No motion, after the budget is passed involving an expenditure of more than Rs.500/- shall be passed by the General Body unless the opinion of the Treasurer has already been read out before the General Body and two-thirds of the members present vote in favor of the motion.
- 35. One or more auditors may be nominated annually by the Patron to audit the accounts.
- 36. The following registers shall be maintained:
 - (a) a register of members;
 - (b)minute-books of the meetings of the General Body, the Council and the Executive

Committee:

- (c) a stock-book of the Union's movable property;
- (d)a cash-book;
- (e) a register of purchase;
- (f) a ledger of receipts and expenditure;
- (g)an accession book for the Library;
- (h)a catalogue for the Library; and
- (i) any other book or register prescribed by the Council or the Executive Committee.

37. The Union shall have a regular administrative office, which will be under the control of the Secretary. There shall be a clerk of the Union. His salary shall be paid from the funds of the Union. The clerk shall have custody of the records of the Union. She/He will work under the control of the Senior Librarian during the vacation. At the time of his appointment she/he shall execute a bond for such sum as the Executive Committee, with the concurrence of the Patron, may decide. The Executive Committee may engage such other staff as may be necessary.

The Executive Committee shall appoint, suspend, dismiss, and otherwise punish the menial staff.

- 38. If any non-member is detected using the property of the Union without the knowledge and permission of the President, her/his name shall be publicly read out by the Chairman at the next meeting of the General Body and if necessary, steps may be taken for the recovery of the property.
- 39. **Vacancies:** When any member of the Executive Committee leaves office permanently or temporarily, she/he shall hand over the charge of the account books etc and the property of the Union to his successor.
- 40. If any student office-bearer of the Executive Committee is unable to carry on his duties temporarily for a period of less than three months and duly takes leave from the Executive Committee, the Executive Committee may appoint one of its student-members to carry on his duties during his absence and if she/he is absent for less than 15 days the President shall appoint any member of the Executive Committee to act for him.
- 41. If any student office-bearer of the Executive Committee who does not attend at least one of its meetings during one term shall cease to be a member unless the Executive Committee decides otherwise.
- 42. If during the year a vacancy arises amongst the student office-bearers of the Union; of the members of the Executive Committee elected under Clause 6 rules (ii), (iii), (iv) and (vi) provided the vacancy is not created due to the provisions of Clause 44 (i); the Council shall elect any member of the Council itself to carry on his duties till the next elections.

43. Popular Control: Vote of No Confidence and the Right of Recall:

A motion of no confidence for the infringement of constitution, neglect of duties or for unbecoming conduct may be moved and passed against the student members of the Executive Committee and the members of the Council.

- 44. The following procedure shall be followed:-
 - (i) Motion of no-confidence against the student office-bearers of the Union as specified in rule 8(B) (i) (b), (c), (e) and (g) or the members of the Council as specified in *rule 6 clauses (ii), (iii), (iv) and (vi)*; individually or collectively, shall be moved in the General Body meeting.
 - (ii) No such motion shall be proposed except on a written request to the Patron of at least 200 ordinary members of the Union.
 - (iii) At least 14 days notice shall be given for the consideration of the motion by the General Body.

- (iv) The motion shall be passed by a two-third majority of the members present and voting at the meeting of General body.
- (v) 500 members shall form the quorum for such a meeting.
- 45. Fresh election will take place within 10 days of the passing of the motion of no-confidence.

46. Ad hoc Committee

- (i) On the passing of the motion of no-confidence against the elected members of the
- Executive Committee as a whole, the General Body shall ordinarily elect an ad hoc Committee of three ordinary members of the Union in the same meeting in which such motion is passed.
- (ii) The Committee shall carry on the work temporarily and can in no case remain in office for more than 30 days after its appointment.
- 47. (a) The Executive Committee can dismiss any person appointed by itself, by the vote of an absolute majority of its members.
 - (b) The Executive Committee may pass a vote of no-confidence against any student member of the Executive Committee. At least seven days notice shall be given for the consideration of such motion by the Executive Committee. It shall be passed by an absolute majority of the members constituting the Executive Committee.
 - (c) If the vote of no confidence is passed by the Executive Committee it shall be referred to the General Body for decision in accordance with clauses (iii), (iv) and (v) of Rule 44.
- 48. The Council may recall any of the five members of the Executive Committee elected by the former. This motion shall not be proposed except at the written request to the President by at least one-third of the members of the Council. At least 10 days notice shall be given for the consideration of the motion. The motion must be adopted by a two-third majority of the members present and voting at the Council meeting. Half of the members of the Council shall form the quorum for such meeting.
- 49. Any association or organization affiliated to the Union may also recall any of its representatives to the Council. This motion shall be proposed only at the written request to the Patron of the Association or the Organization by at least one-third of the members thereof. At least seven days notice shall be given for the consideration of the motion. The motion should be adopted by a two third majority of the members present and voting at the meeting. Fifty percent of the members shall form the quorum for such a meeting.
- 50. Change in the Constitution: Changes in the constitution of the Union and the regulations formed there under can only be made by the Executive Council of the University either: (i) on the motion of the Executive Committee, the Council and the General Body of the Union, or (ii) on their own initiative, after giving notice to the Executive Committee, and taking into consideration any views that the Executive Committee, the Council and the General Body of the Union may express within the time allowed by the Executive Council of the University.





Annexure-1

Our Notes on Accounts on Balance Sheet As at 31st March 2010 & Income & Expenditure A/C & Receipt & Payment Accounts for the year ended on the same date.

- 1 The Accounts of university has been prepared on the basis of Single entry System. However we strongly feel & recommend that the accounts should be prepared on the basis of Double entry system which is more logical & practical looking into the size & magnitude of the transactions of the University.
- The accounts of the University are generally maintained on Cash basis except various advances given to departments, agencies & employees which were adjusted in the expenditure on the basis of submission of final bills by them.
- 3 The provisions of outstanding expenses are not made in the balance sheet as at 31.03.2010 which is in accordance with the university policy of 'Payments as per budget'.
- The University has generally maintained separate Cash Book for different Funds but the Income/
 Receipt side are either not filled or filled incorrectly. Hence these figures have been generally
 ignored & not considered for the preparation of financial statements. However the Bank Deposit
 book maintained by the Cashier office has been taken as base for Receipt side. Further several
 other deposits, which were not mentioned in bank book but duly supported by proper deposit slips
 & other deposit proofs, were considered, to the extent possible, on the basis of best judgment.
- Page no.515 & 516 is missing in the Deposit register of old campus. As per software report, receipt of 12/08/09 and 13/08/09 (expected on page no 515 and 516) were of Rs. 55.61 Lacs. Hence the total Income of Rs.55.61 Lacs is considered as income in the year 2009-10. Due to non-availability of pages of Deposit register, correct bank account, where these receipts were deposited, could not be ascertained; hence the same has been shown in Suspense account.
- 6 The cashbook/bank deposit book does not give details of head wise income. Although the head wise income/ receipt are maintained in separate software, the details available in the reports generated/ produced before us were not sufficient to consider the figures for preparation of financial Statement.
- 7 The Expenditure / Payment side of the cash book has been considered for preparation of various financial statements. However, in the cash book, the expenditures have not been categorized in between the Revenue Expenditure & Capital nature expenditure. Moreover several heads of account, mentioned in the expenditure side of Cash book are incomplete. In the light of the above the categorization of Head of accounts of Expenditure & segregation of expenditure in between Revenue & Capital nature, have been made, to the extent possible, on the basis of best judgment.



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- 8 The bank balance shown in the different Receipt & payment a/c's & Balance sheet as at 31.03.2010 are subject to pending entries in Bank reconciliation statement as on 31.03.2010.
- 9 The following transactions were generally not recorded in the concerned Cash books/ Bank Deposit book:-
 - > Funds transferred from one bank a/c to another bank a/c's
 - ➤ Bank Charges & Bank Interests applied/ paid by the bank in the respective a/c's
 - Amount Directly deposited by the employees & students in the bank a/c's of University
 - > Cheques returned by bank / Represented/ Re deposited in bank for clearing
 - > RTGS transfers
- 10 The grant received from UP Government, Central Institutions, UGC & CSIR has been taken from the different grant registers been maintained by the university.
- 11 The separate Dead stock/ fixed assets register were not maintained by the University. Hence the opening balance of the different assets has been taken on the basis of historical cost shown in the last year's balance sheet.

 Moreover the assets purchased during the year were not separately mentioned in the concerned cash books. Hence, as per the past practice, the additions made during the year 2009-10 in the furniture, Land & Building, Equipments, Books, Vehicles & other assets have been made on the basis of explanations, Information & best assessment of the concerned cash books. Due to this the possibility of showing few capital expenditures in Revenue expenditure can not be ruled out.

bossionity of showing few capital experientates in the state of the strongly feel that the physical verification of fixed assets including Books of library is required.

- 12 The Value of Land & building has been taken on the basis of historical cost as shown in the last year's balance sheet as at 31.03.2009. No additions were made in the land & building during the year. In this reference it may be noted that several advances amounting to Rs 1191.25 Lacs in General & Other funds has been given to different agencies for construction of different buildings of the university. However in absence of any completion certificate from these agencies, the same are considered to be under construction & not capitalized during the year.
- 13 The Investments in Fixed deposits were not properly accounted by the University. No separate register /working for FDR's were maintained .However the amounts of FDR were taken on the basis of Fixed Deposit Receipts produced before us.
- 14 As per the practice of university, the advances given to different departments & employees, pending adjustments, are shown in the Balance sheet as advances. The adjustments of advances are not accounted in the Cash book. Hence the adjustments have been shown directly in the Income & expenditure a/c on the basis of D&C registers of different fund. However in absence of proper maintenance of cash book, the booking of few advances directly in the expenditure head could not be ruled out.

The old advances' still pending for adjustments needs immediate attention & adjustments.

15 The Companies Act 1956 Or Income tax Act 1961 are not applicable on university, hence depreciation suggested in these Act's are not provided for in the financial statements.

- Grant of Rs.1 crore received through State Govt. dated 31.03.10 which has been directly deposited to A/c no.2481 during 2010-11. Hence the same has not been considered in the grants of the year 2009-10.
- 17 The separate Balance sheet, Income & Expenditure Account & Receipt & Payments Account of the Art College & self finance courses are also prepared & consolidated with the other funds of the university as on 31.03.2010. These statements are also subject to all the notes & references mentioned above in note no 1 to 16.

In addition to above the Balance sheet, Income & Expenditure Account & Receipt & Payments Account as on 31.03.2010 is prepared by us on the basis of information, clarifications & explanations given to us & records produced before us.



The Department of Biochemistry has earmarked the following areas under which work components would be organized. These programs are in consonance with the research activities of the departmental faculty members and also employ and complement the already existing facilities of core biochemistry, molecular biology, cell biology and bioinformatics.

The proposed areas of research are strongly backed by the research expertise as well as the research interests of the faculty members. The following areas of research have been identified as research agenda:

Biotechnological modification of lignin biosynthesis:

All vascular plants, including herbaceous species, contain lignin as an integral cell wall constituent along with cellulose and hemicellulose. Lignin provides rigidity and strength to the plant as well as it protects cellulose microfibrils from the physical, chemical and biological attack. However, presence of lignin in plant materials is one of the greatest obstacle for the optimal use of the biomass for various purposes such as pulping industry, nutrition of cattle and new technologies concerned with the biodegradation of lignocellulosic materials. Therefore, reduction in lignin contents, through genetic engineering approaches, is desirable in both woody and herbaceous plants.

In this direction, we have successfully developed transgenic plants of tobacco and *Arabidopsis*, exhibiting inhibition of lignin, by expression of a heterologous antisense gene construct specific to caffeic acid / 5- hydroxyferulic acid O-methyltransferase (OMT), a key enzyme in regulating lignin biosynthesis. Furthermore, we have developed a transformation system for *Leucaena leucocephala* using *Agrobacterium tumefaciens* mediated DNA transfer. *Leucaena leucocephala* (subabul) is a nitrogen fixing legume adopted to and widely distributed throughout the tropics and subtropics. In India almost 40% of the paper is manufactured using *Leucaena leucocephala* wood.

Currently, we are working on to clone a number of genes of lignin biosynthesis pathway and to produce transgenic plants of *Leucaena leucocephala* with reduced lignin contents which are desirable traits for its use in paper and pulp industry.

In addition to the applied work we also propose to carry out basic studies on structure - function relationship of these enzymes. Thus, the clones of these genes will be expressed in *E.coli* and the expressed proteins will be purified and characterized. (**Biotechnol. Prog. 22, 609-616. 2006; The Haworth Press, Inc., Binghamton, NY, U.S.A. 317-329, 2008**)

❖ Biochemistry and Molecular Biology of fruit ripening:

Fruit ripening is a tightly controlled and highly complex developmental process involving novel gene expression and the coordination of a number of biochemical and physiological processes that culminates in dramatic changes in fruit firmness, colour, flavour, aroma and overall texture of fruit. Flavour and fruit texture become the major quality attributes according to the consumer's perception and therefore have received much research attention. Phenylpropanoid pathway, which supplies building blocks for lignin, also contributes to various phenolic compounds, found in many fleshy fruits during ripening. In addition, lignin biosynthesis and cellulose hydrolysis is a meticulously coordinated and regulated during fruit ripening. Studies have suggested that the increase in fruit firmness involves a coordinated regulation of lignin biosynthesis and cellulose hydrolysis. However, the interaction between lignin and cellulose deposition is still not clearly known. The complexity of lignin biosynthetic pathway has made analysis of lignin polymerization mechanisms a challenging topic. An integrated approach on lignin, monolignol precursors, associated enzymes and genes, would provide a consistent model of lignifications during fruit ripening. But, in recent years, results based on transgenic approach have led to proposition of newer concepts to classical lignin biosynthesis pathway.

There are several genes which are involved in lignin biosynthesis pathway but we propose the biochemical and molecular study of only following candidate genes, namely *O*-methyltransferase (*omt*), cinnamyl alcohol dehydrogenase (*cad*) and peroxidase (*pod*) that are considered to have a potential role in fruit ripening and flavonoid biosynthesis. Role of these enzymes/genes in fruit ripening is a matter of recent investigation and there is still dearth of

information on the relationships between lignin biosynthetic pathway and fruit ripening process. (J. food sci. 2010, Journal of Molecular Catalysis B: Enzymatic, 68 (2) 2011, pp. 117-128)

Role of lysosomal proteases in disease: Regulation of the misfolded protein response:

Recent interest in the lysosomal proteinases like Cathepsins B, H and L originates in the discovery of their possible roles in prohormone processing, inflammatory and pathological diseases (e.g. tumor invasion, metastasis, muscular dystrophy emphysema and arthritis) and cellular differentiation. Despite their several roles in protein catabolism, exact mechanism of action of each enzyme is not known. Also, there is inadequate information on their natural substrates and conditions of action *in vivo*. Since these enzymes are very sensitive towards temperature and have acidic pH optimum, their involvement in protein degradation under physiological conditions, where the pH is maintained between pH 7.0 – 7.5, have been questioned. Thus, our knowledge of the significance of the existence of these analogous enzymes is still incomplete. Therefore, to understand the role of each proteinase in a variety of biological processes and to identify with confidence the specific catalytic reactions, we need detailed information on the catalytic site properties of each enzyme.

Our group has studied some properties of Cathepsin B purified from mammalian species and it has been found that the enzyme could indeed play a role in intracellular protein degradation. The unfolding-refolding behavior and mechanism of inactivation by urea of Cathepsin B have also been studied which indicate the presence of multi-domain structure in the enzyme. These finding have been published in pioneer journals like Biochem. J., J. Biochem., J. Biochem., IJBB, Biochem. Int., Cell. Mol. Biochem., (2010) etc. However, to understand the role of each proteinase in a variety of biological processes and to identify with confidence their specificity, detailed information is required on the action of each enzyme on various protein substrates and peptides, and the relation of structural changes induced by intra-and extra-cellular modulators.

Biochemistry of diabetes & associated secondary complications:

Diabetes mellitus is one of the major clinical concern and cause of morbidity in developed as well as in developing country. Degenerative changes occur in heart, kidney, brain and other neural

tissues during diabetes. Cardiomyopathy, nephropathy, neuropathy and cataract are common complications of diabetes mellitus. Several studies had demonstrated that oxidative stress due to hyperglycemia resulted in free radical generation and contributes to progression of diabetes-related complications. In addition to insulin a large number of anti-diabetic formulations are available in the market but due to unwanted side effects the efficacies of these compounds are debatable and there is a demand for new and safe compounds for the management of diabetes. Several natural products such as Momordica charantia, Trigonella foenum graecum, Syzygium cumini, Azadirachta indica, Gymnema sylvestre, Pterocarpus marsupim, Coccinia indica, , Allium sativum, and Ocimum sanctum etc are being used in India as well as other parts of the world for the management of diabetes and to overcome secondary complications of diabetes. These plants based formulations are found to be effective, their low cost and minimal side effects have increased the interest of researchers to explore this area.

For past few years, our lab is trying to understand the biochemistry of diabetic complications and to evaluate the potential of different medicinal plants (M. charantia, Trigonella foenum-graecum, S. cumini etc) to manage hyperglycemia and associated complications. Our initial findings have demonstrated the cardio-protective potential of MC and TFG extracts. The anti-hyperglycemic and anti-oxidative activities present in aqueous extracts of M. charantia (MC) and Trigonella foenumgraecum (TFG) are the two different activities associated to different constituents present in these plant extracts. The administration of these plant extracts resulted in improved oxidative stress status was not due to achievement of normoglycemia. In MC extract these activities are attributed to peptide(s) present. We have been able to isolate these peptides and their further characterization such as amino acid sequence and molecular mass will help us to understand their mode of action at cellular level. The active constituents from other plants will also be isolated/purified, characterized and evaluated for their anti-diabetic potential. We are also attempting to understand the mechanism of secondary complications of diabetes such as cataract. We have been able to partially purify and demonstrate the role of a calcium independent protease in progression of diabetic cataract. We have reported that kaempferol, a flavonoid, inhibited the activity of aldose reductase in osteoblast cells. Role of aldose reductase have been implicated in progression of secondary complications of diabetes in tissues where glucose up-take is insulin independent. Attempts will be made to test the effect of these plant - isolated products (which are mainly alkaloids, proteins/peptides and flavonoids) to delay/cure the secondary complications (cataract, atherosclerosis and nephropathy) of diabetes. Some of these findings have been already been published in peer reviewed journals like Proteomics, 2010; IJBB, 2010; Oxidative Medicine & Cellular Longevity, 2009; and Phocog. Res., 2009.

❖ Oxidative stress related mechanisms in cell injury

Work in another major research group has been going on, on the role of oxidative stress in the toxicity caused by various hepatotoxins such as rotenone and ethanol on isolated rat liver cells and the protective effects of various naturally occurring and synthetic antioxidants. Rotenone is a plant product and is a known inhibitor of mitochondrial respiratory electron transport chain. Both rotenone and ethanol decreased the viability of isolated rat liver cells prepared through the collagenase perfusion technique in a concentration dependant manner. This was found to be reversed by antioxidants such as Vitamin E, reduced Glutathione (GSH), superoxide dismutase (SOD) and catalase to varying degrees.

Further studies are currently underway to observe the synergistic effects of carbonyl iron overload and ethanol *in vivo*. Quantification of parameters related to oxidative stress, such as lipid peroxidation is being carried out in liver homogenates. Research is currently underway to evaluate the phototoxicity of hair dye ingredients by measuring the reactive oxygen generation by the hair dyes under different irradiation conditions (Natural sunlight and Ultra violet radiation). Skin photosensitization, potential DNA photodamage and Linoleic acid photooxidative potential of the selected hair dye ingredients will also be screened. **The experimental findings have been published in journals like Ind. J. Exp. Biol., Toxicol. Intl. etc**.

Prospecting for new paradigms in plant development-New players, new targets:

One of the groups working in the area of plant biochemistry has identified a novel Ca²⁺ activated protease that appears to be critical in initiating the cleavage of storage proteins in germinating seeds. The protease has since been purified to homogeneity and has been observed to express in a number of varieties of mungbean, pigeon pea and urdbean, as well as black gram seeds. However, this protease is absent from other pulses and non-grain legumes. This points to a very important relationship, crafted through evolution, between the storage proteins, the ionic environment of its

hydrolysis and the type of protease initiating the mobilization process. Ca²⁺ binding studies vis-à-vis the conformational changes that bring about activation of this enzyme have to be worked out. This group has also developed a new protocol for determining cell wall chelated ion concentration, *but* the same has to be validated through ICP analysis. As the next logical step, the protease has to be identified and sequenced and the information regarding its expression unravelled.

Separately, considerable preliminary work has been done on tracing the oxidative damage trail from the elongating plant axis to the storage organs (in this cae, the cotyledons). The reluctance of the plant axis to contain ROS produced by the high rates of respiration appears to confirm the hypothesis that these ROS are being used for signalling to the storage organ for mobilization of reserves. Treatment of the germinating seeds with edaravon, a potent lipophilic ROS scavenger and by hydroxyurea, a cell-cycle stalling chemical, results in failure of reserve mobilization, strongly hinting at the "ROS as signalling species" theory. Additionally, Protein conformational changes subsequent to oxidative amino acid residue modification yields altered states of hydrophobicity, triggering a signalling cascade, which can be probed with 2D-PAGE and multiplexing as well as with LC-MC and CD spectroscopy.

Much work remains to be done by quantifying ROS gradient as well as the status of intracellular signals like Ca²⁺ and cGMP. Recent work has been published in journals like J. Plant Physiol.(2010), Z. Phytopath.(2010), and Ind. J. Biochem. Biophys. (2010)

Studies in photosynthesis:

There are two groups studying photosynthesis. These two aspects are mentioned below:

a. Photosystems are embedded in a lipid matrix and are subject to stoichiometric as well as small organizational changes that bring about small to large changes in activity and help in acclimation. One of the several ways in which systems modulate photosynthetic energy conversion is alteration of the lipid environment in the immediate vicinity of the photosystems. Analysis of the lipid microenvironment in thylakoids from differently adapted chloroplasts may yield useful information that could relate this microenvironment to functional changes and possibly to structural alterations in peptide arrangement or covalent modification. This would involve isolation of PS II complexes and analysis of thylakoid lipidome. The lipid composition would be determined and lipids identified using the LC-MS and these would be functionally related to PS II activity after fluorescence (pulse

amplitude modulated) analysis. Recent publications are in **Photosynthetica** (2009), **Biol. Plant.** (2010), **Life Sci.** (2010).

Nutrient deficiencies result in the lowered expression of proteins using metal cofactors. Such proteins include components of energy transducing electron transport systems as well as redox enzymes with metal centres. Metal homeostasis in general, and particularly in the context of redox systems is an emerging field of study. One of the proposed components of the research agenda is to probe the relative expression of photosynthetic electron transport components, quantify the ROS produced in conditions of trace element deficiency and lastly to study the expression levels of ROS scavenging enzymes that themselves employ metal centres. This would lead to valuable insight into the redox control of metal homeostasis and the control of gene expression in times of stress. The work elements would involve the study of photosynthetic rates, measurement of fluorescence parameters (using PAM fluorimeter), measurement of CO₂ fluxes using the Infra Red Gas Analyzer, western transfer mediated quantitation of the redox/ROS scavenging components and finally, transcript levels of the same. Initial work has been published in **J. Plant Physiol. (2007).**

52. Future plans of the department.

Due to population blast and continuous industrialization and urbanization, the available cultivable space is being decreased every day. The immense loss of plant growth and yield due to disease spread, the plant yield is also going down. Intensive cultivation, erosion caused by wind and water, and ecological alterations have caused significant soil degradation that has led to an adverse impact in the agriculture arena, which will continue unless addressed. Some of the soil properties that have been lost include organic matter, soil structure and nutrient availability etc. The populations of micro-fauna and micro-flora have been reduced. The Green Revolution focused on increasing staple crop productivity without considering impacts on human diets and nutrient intake, that has exacerbated human nutrient deficiencies of Fe, Zn, I etc. while intensive cropping has decreased the capacity of soils to supply Zn, B, Mo, Mn, Cu to crops. Enhancing substances (e.g. ascorbic acid, S-containing amino

acids etc.) that promote micronutrient availability or decreasing antinutrient substances (e.g. phytate, polyphenolics etc.) that inhibit micronutrient bioavailability, are both options that could be pursued. Plant viruses cause immense losses in yield of infected plants and thus acquire significance in the economic scenario since plants infected by them are both crop plants as well as ornamentals. The problem acquires greater proportions on account of viruses being unresponsive to chemicals. There is very compelling global human health and nutritional evidence to convince plant breeders, plant physiologists, soil scientists, pathologists, virologists etc. for sustained researches to combat these situations. Based on the current situation the present studies are proposed to increase the nutrition value of main food plants, protecting the plant health from any kind of diseases so as to have better yield.

The departmental performance including teachers and research activities are being regularly evaluated yearly by Experts of UGC & DST for the last swash years. On the basis of our performance we were rated Excellent by DST in the year 2007.

- 50. Briefly highlight the contributions of the department in generating new knowledge, basic or applied.:
- The Department carried out research in areas of Quaternary and Precambrian stratigraphy, palaeontology, stratigraphy and sedimentology.
- Especial emphasis has been for the study of interplay of climate and neo-tectonics on the geomorphic evolution of Ganga Plain and Himalaya.
- Multi-proxy data has been used to understand the climate change during Holocene in the lake deposits from Ganga plain and Himalaya and its effects on palaeo- vegetation.
- Studies of glaciers of Himalaya relate to the morphotectonic evolution and chronology of glaciations in the central Himalayan region while those of Ny-Alysund (Spitizbergen, Norway) show that most of the glaciers are receding at a fast rate.
- Environmental investigation of Ganga plain, namely pollution of surface and ground water show high level of heavy metal and other pollutants.
- Systematic studies of Vindhyans, Marwar supergroup and Lesser Himalayas (Late Proterozoic) show unique development with well preserved biotic elements. The biotic elements exhibit much morphological diversity, complex biotic features in microscopic and megascopic life.
- Investigations in the Tertiary sediments of northeast and Kachchh basin has helped in precise age determination and palaeoecological reconstruction. Miocene rocks of Mizoram show evidence of delta sedimentation.
- **51.** Detail five major Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and challenges (SWOC) of the department.

Strengths	 There is a very healthy relationship and interaction between the teachers and the taught. The students are encouraged to have open discussions with the faculty members. The faculty members also have a very informal interaction amongst themselves throughout. In spite of decreasing numbers of faculty members, almost all the theory as well as practical classes are taken as per the schedule. Many of the retired faculty members have been assisting in regular teaching on Honorary basis. Based on our publications, we have been funded under various programmes like CAS- Phase I and II (UGC); Special Grant for Infrastructure (UGC); FIST- Phase I and II; PURSE (DST); Centre of Excellence (U P Government). Detailed geoenvironmental studies in some selected areas of Ganga plain and in the Himalayan region are proposed to be carried out. This include groundwater and surface water pollution, soil pollution, identification of Ground water potential zones and ground water harvesting sites, slope instability studies etc. Remote Sensing and GIS applications in high resolution surface processes.

☐ Glaciological Studies

High resolution glacio-geomorphic mapping of some selected glaciers along with the study of a number of paleoclimatic proxies (sedimentological, palynological, and magnetic) are proposed to be carried out. Such studies supported by ¹⁴C, T/L, OSL dates will help in a better understanding of the chronology of glaciation and deglaciation vis-à-vis past climatic changes.

□ Palaeobiology of Proterozoic Sedimentary Basins

The available Proterozoic palaeobiological data of the Vindhyan and Marwar sedimentary basins suggest that these basins have great potential in contributing to the evolution of megascopic life, particularly the time of emergence of animal clade and invasion of terrestrial life. A systematic study of the Vindhyan and Marwar and coeval basins of Peninsular India and Lesser Himalyan Sedimentary basins is therefore proposed to be carried out to understand the Microbially Induced Sedimentary Structures (MISS) and evolution of macroalgal fossils.

- (c) The strategy of development should cater to the basic needs of the people at the grass root level, and

However, the development policies dictated by sophisticated growth models of the developed countries characterized the heterogeneous and disintegrated money markets, governments' prompt accountability to be electorate in the grip of the revolution of rising expectations, over - ambitious economic planning, unbridled growth of consumerism, ready and generous availability of foreign aid and unstable polities coupled with aggressive populism, inter alia, call for an inter-disciplinary approach to the study of the problems of development.

The Regional Centre for Urban & Environmental Studies (RCUES), Lucknow was established at University of Lucknow in the year 1968 by the Ministry of Urban Development, Government of India. It is one of the premier Centres in the country established to play a positive role in the field of urban management. The key activities of the Centre include training, capacity building, research, teaching, consultancy services and dissemination of information relating to the urban sector in the states of Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Odisha, Uttarakhand, Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, Manipur & Sikkim. The Centre provides its expertise, advisory services & consultancy services to urban local bodies all over the country.

As National Network of Resource Centres (NNRC) & National Resource Centre (NRC) under Ministry of Housing & Poverty Alleviation (MOHUPA), GOI the Centre has been entrusted since past 5 years with the responsibility of human resource development through capacity building activities of officials & non-officials with regard to planning, implementation etc. of the flagship schemes of Ministry viz. SJSRY/Proposed NULM, RAY, USHA etc. in 16 states of the country viz. Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Odisha, Uttarakhand, Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, West Bengal, all N.E. States and Sikkim.

The Regional Centre through its mandate intends to build the Capacities of City Managers for Achieving Good Urban Governance.

Objectives:

a. To provide advisory and consultancy services to the Departments of Urban Development and other related Departments & Agencies in the participating States and Govt. of India on various issues relating to urban administration, urban planning and development and management of environmental and ecological aspects.

- b. To implement government schemes and projects given by the Departments of Urban Development and other related Departments & Agencies of the participating States and Govt. of India.
- c. To collaborate with other agencies, institutions and organizations in such a manner as may be necessary for the promotion of the objectives of the Centre.
- d. To undertake training of personnel and elected representatives of State Government, Urban Local Bodies in the States and other agencies dealing with Urban affairs and also for personnel from other developing countries.

- j. To prepare, print and publish papers, periodicals and books in furtherance of the objectives of the Centre.
- k. To do all other things that are incidental to or decisive for the attainment of furtherance of the aims and objectives of the Centre and,
- l. To do all the other things that is incidental to or decisive for management and control of the Centre.

Institute of Women Studies

The Institute of Women's Studies, Lucknow University was established in 1997 and started a two-year post-graduate course leading to the degree of Master of Arts in Women's Studies since then. In 2002 the Institute organised seven special lectures and three workshops for the students and teachers of Women's Studies. It also organised the annual Shivadasani Memorial Lecture by Professor Kumkum Sangari of Delhi University. The Institute started a unique campaign for Gender sensitisation, focusing on the students of various Departments and Associated Colleges of Lucknow University. The campaign includes a poster exhibition, a street play, songs and an open-house discussion and interactive session with the students. The exhibition, songs and street play were displayed and enacted repeatedly in the U.P. Youth Festival also, and it got extraordinary attention and appreciation from the media and also from the participants who came from different cities to our University. The campaign was taken, on demand, to Allahabad University as well.

In 2003 the Gender Sensitisation Campaign continued with success. Follow-Up programmes were held in some of the Colleges/Departments where we had gone in 2002 and several new Colleges were covered. The Campaign is continuing till date. The Institute took up another new programme in 2003 under the title "Meet Women of Accomplishment" with a view to interacting with those women who have accomplished special goals or positions, and to share their life-experience with the students who are yet to shape their destiny. Under this Series five achievers visited the Institute and had long sessions with the students and the Faculty. These achievers came from different back- grounds: two were teachers of great repute, one scientist with several awards to her credit, one journalist (the only women resident editor in U.P.) and one famous poetess. The students had acquaintance with a plurality of life-stories and multiplicity of the strategies which a woman may adopt to reach a worthwhile destiny.

Population Research centre

The Population Research Centre, formerly known as Demographic Research Centre, was established in July 1966 in the Department of Economics, University of Lucknow, Lucknow with the financial support of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, New Delhi. This is the only Institution of its kind in the most populous state of the country. Its primary aim is to carry out researches and studies on demographic features, patterns and trends in Uttar Pradesh, their underlying factors and their impact on economic and human resource development. It also undertakes studies to extend research support to the changing strategies of the country's Family Welfare Programme.

The Centre, as an integral part of the Department of Economics, started with a core staff of twelve persons-nine research workers and three supporting staff. The Head of the Department is the ex -officio Director of the Centre. Within a short span, the Centre, because of its important research contributions in the field of population, was accorded the status of a fully developed centre in 1972. At present the staff strength of the Centre comprises 23 persons-15 research workers and 8 supporting staff. The research staff includes one Additional Director, one Joint Director, two Assistant Directors, four Research Investigators, four Field Investigators and three Tabulators.

The research thrust of the Centre has been on different aspects of V.P.'s population, particularly fertility, infant and child mortality, mutuality, population education, migration and evaluation of national programmes on women and child development and family planning. The research studies of the centre are normally based on the data collected through large scale field surveys conducted in different districts of the state. In addition, the analysis of secondary data collected in different surveys and Government Reports are carried out in the Centre over the years.

Over a passage of 37 years, the Centre has completed about 140 research studies on the above mentioned areas.

During the year 2003 the Centre has organized:

1. Three days Training Workshop on POPLINE BIBLIOGRAPHIC REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH DATABASE (sponsored by International Instib1te for Population Sciences, Mumbai) March 11-13, 2003. The workshop was attended by 20 participants belonging to various institutions located at Lucknow.

2. Two days Regional Conference of the Indian Association for the Study of Population on "Emerging issues on Population, Health and Environment in Northern States of India" (November 13-14,2003). In this conference key note address was given by Dr. Francois M Farah UNFPA Representative for India and 35 research papers were presented by outstation and local members of the association.

- 4. Verification of last doses of immunization, third ANC and PNC check up in Varanasi district of Uttar Pradesh.,
- 5. Unmet need for family planning in Uttar Pradesh.

Institute of Mass Communication in Science and Technology

The Institute of Mass Communication in Science & Technology was established in 1995 with the support of National Council for Science & Technology Communication (NCSTC), D.S. T., Ministry of, Science & Technology, Govt of India, New Delhi with the twin objectives of popularization of Science & Technology and stimulation of scientific temper among the masses. This programme was initiated by Prof. M.S. Sodha, FNA, former Vice-Chancellor, Lucknow University with active involvement of Prof. V.D. Gupta, Former Vice-Chancellor, Gorakhpur and Allahabad University. The Institute got strengthened under the leadership of Prof. Bhoomittra Dev, Former Vice-Chancellor, Rohilkhand and Gorakhpur University. To attain these objectives a Master's programme (M.Sc. Tech) consisting of three semesters was initiated with the intake capacity of 15 students from science post-graduate and graduates from the medical and engineering fields. The aim of this academic programme was to prepare Science & Technology Communicators, who could design, maintain and manage systems that ensured smooth flow of useful information from scientists & technologists to the Industry and Society.

To make this skill and job oriented academic programme more attractive, meaningful and market need oriented few modifications were made such as:

- i. The name of this programme changed to "M.Sc. in Mass Communication in Science & Technology" instead of M.Sc. (Tech.).
- ii To attract young dynamic and fresh talent the eligibility was brought to the level of graduation from Science, Medical and Engineering disciplines.
- iii. The duration of 18 months was also changed to 2 years consisting of 4 semesters, each of 6 months duration.
- iv. On the advice of University Grants Commission, New Delhi, the syllabus was extensively revised with the incorporation of employment and skill oriented topics such as, Computer education, Information technology, Advertising, Public Relations, Newspaper Management & Printing, Audio Visuals, Press laws, History, Philosophy and Popularization of Science & Technology.

Field work and Project were designed so as to educate the students with the practical knowledge and experience of Media, Computer and Science related activities. Preparation of experimental Newspaper/Tabloid bulletin, pamphlets etc. were also a part or academic exercise. The students have been regularly providing services of media-related jobs and managing various National and International Conferences, Symposia & Workshops etc. being organized by National Research laboratories, Govt. departments and NGOs e.g. 89th sessions of Indian Science Congress and various seminars hosted by different departments of Science faculty and other local CSIR Institutes were covered by our students by making reports, press-releases, pamphlets etc. They have worked on several projects based on various topics from Science & Technology field and also useful topics for the Society. Such work is under progress of population. This year Institute is also willing to extend the academic programme by enrolling students for PhD. in the subject. Active interactions being regularly organized between Scientists, Research labs and our students. The placement of our students has been satisfactory. Our students are getting employment in Media Houses, Corporate sectors and other organizations in India and Abroad. Our students have also been qualifying in U.G.C. NET examinations.

This academic programme has now become a highly professional and job oriented with the persistent and active efforts of Director of the Institute, Prof. A.K. Sharma, faculty and staff.

Centre of Bioinformatics

Objective:

The University of Lucknow, established in 1921 is a leading and largest residential university in the State. The Bioinformatics Infrastructure Facility (BIF) Centre (supported by DBT), at Department of Biochemistry, University of Lucknow, was established in the year 2007. The Bioinformatics Infrastructure Facility (BIF) Centre is well equipped with various hardwares & softwares, (Exome Horizon, MATLAB, Discovery Studio, DNA STAR etc.), Servers for Database Application, Desktop machines, and high speed Internet Connection. Department of Higher education, Government of Uttar Pradesh, Lucknow has selected our Bioinformatics facility as a Centre of Excellence in Bioinformatics.

Major activities of the centre:

- ➤ Short term Training/workshops for students, researchers and faculties in the area of Bioinformatics.
- ➤ Long term (3-6 months) project work for post graduation (Biotechnology/Bioinformatics) students.
- ➤ Bioinformatics teaching/practical, as a part of M.Sc. Biotechnology and Biochemistry curriculum, to the students of this department.
- ➤ Database development for medicinally important secondary metabolites.

Research activities in the following areas:

- > Genomic, Proteomics and metabolomics of lignin biosynthetic and degradative enzymes such as Cinnamyl Alcohol Dehydrogenase, O-Methyl Transferase, β- DGlucosidase, Peroxidase and Laccase.
- ➤ Novel drug target identification and drug designing using comparative genomics, proteomics and metabolomics.
- > Drug target identification and drug designing for anticholinergic, anti-inflammatory, anti-diabetic and anti-cancerous.

Dr. Giri Lal Gupta Institute of Public Health and Public Affairs (GLGIOPH)

Background

India has had a long tradition of health education, training and research. A large network of public health related research institutions developed over the 20th century, some having been set up in the colonial period and most others added post-Independence. The All India Institute of Hygiene & Public Health, the ICMR and its various institutes, the NICD, NTI, NIHFW, the CSMCH at JNU and the PSM departments in medical colleges have been engaged in public health education, training and research for periods ranging from over hundred years to thirty years.

However, by and large, the understanding of medical professionals, nurses and other health workers about public health is inadequate, both at the policy-making levels and at the various implementation levels.

With emphasis on processes of decentralization and district level planning, there is increasing requirement for public health expertise, both to analyse the epidemiological situation and to use the analysis to do health systems planning and programming.

Various committees like Bhore Committee (1946) and Mudaliar Committee (1961) strongly recommended the setting up of departments of preventive and social medicine (PSM) in medical colleges; post-graduate training of two types – a shorter training in PSM/Public Health for health workers (three months to one year); and a longer training for specialists in preventive health work for teaching, research and administrative needs of the public health system (3-5 years); training of nurses in public health and a cadre of public health engineers, public health inspectors and public health laboratory workers to be trained by the All India Institute of Hygiene and Public Health and other institutions.

India has historically made "an inadequate effort to address public health problems." Over the years, spending on health has amounted to around 1.5% of gross domestic product, with an even lower proportion being spent on public health. Even those few public health measures that have been funded have had limited efficacy because of poor execution. Fundamentally, the institutional base for health services is weak," nongovernmental organisations are underutilised, and finally, but perhaps most significantly, the private sector is "gigantic," virtually completely unregulated, and offers "some of the best and the worst care seen anywhere.

Efforts are being made to set the situation in positive direction. Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI) has been formed and the ball has been set rolling.

On the other plane, a group of highly professional and socially conscious people came together with an aim to make a paradigm shift in the field of public health in India and chose Uttar Pradesh to start the intervention and subsequently foundation stone was laid for **Dr. Giri Lal Gupta Institute of Public Health and Public Affairs.** The institute is a result of the association of some nationally eminent people like;

This Institute has been created to fulfill following objectives:

- (I) To develop health manpower by providing post-graduate training facilities;
- (II) To conduct researches relating to various health problems and disease in the community;
- (III) To provide the support services in urban (slum) and rural areas;
- (IV) To support and guide various programs at National level. and
- (V) To act as a comprehensive, capacity building, training and awareness generation institution.

The Institute is running following courses at the moment:

- 1. Master of Public Health
- 2. Post Graduate Diploma in Medical, Health and Wellness Tourism
- 3. Diploma in Health and Hygiene

The Institute is housed in its own building in the New Campus of the University. It is a state-of-art building constructed through generous contribution by Sri Vinod Gupta.

GLGIOPH also offers a basket of services/programs; the cost of which depends upon the requirement, number of persons, types of service (short term and exhaustive), number of days and logistical needs.

In our one year's existence, we have done some work that may indicate our intentions. Following are the main activities of the Institute in 2007-08:

Hall, Department of Social Work, University of Lucknow, Lucknow, on 29 Oct.07 "Disease Control & Health Promotion: Current & Future Challenges in Achieving Millennium Development Goal"
