UG students account for 59% of internships at LU

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LUCKNOW: As many as 5,278 students completed internships at Lucknow University in 2025-26, with undergraduate (UG) students accounting for 58.9% of the tally. The data reflects the push under the National Education Policy 2020 to make students industry-ready from the undergraduate level itself.

The number of those who completed internships includes 3,107 UG and 2,171 postgraduate (PG) students, according to a consolidated faculty-wise UG and PG internship summary shared by the university, a copy of which HT has seen.

Commerce, Applied Economics and Law emerged as the most



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UG-driven faculties. Commerce recorded 322 internships with 250 UG (77.6%), Applied Economics accounted for 276 internships with 220 UG (79.7%), and Law had 215 internships with 170 LL.B. students (79%).

The Faculty of Arts, the largest faculty, reported the highest absolute number at 2,637 (1,571 UG, 1,066 PG) followed by Science with 1,213 students (640 UG,

573 PG). Science had the highest PG share among large faculties at 47.2%. Professional faculties together accounted for 737 students who completed internships. Engineering recorded 316 (215 students from B.Tech and 101 students from M.Tech), Law 215 (170 and 45, LL.B. and LL.M. students respectively), and Management Studies 206 PG students. The Faculty of Education had the smallest share with 93 students (41 students from B.Ed., 26 students from M.Ed and 26 M.A. Education).

Vice chancellor Prof J P Saini said, "Abiding by NEP 2020, we are pushing students to get internships to get first-hand experience in their fields. This will also make them employable once they graduate."

South Asian Buddhists take LU route to trace Buddha's life

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LUCKNOW : Buddhist monks from South Asia, are taking Lucknow University route to enhance their knowledge about Buddha's life. Dressed in robes of dark hues - maroon, vermilion and grey, they stand out on the campus, as they move to and from classes.

They are majorly distributed

in PhD, BA and MA courses in departments including - studies in linguistics, English, Sanskrit, Philosophy, Ancient Indian History, Psychology. Currently there are 35 monks studying at the university, said director International Cell prof RP Singh.

"There has been a significant increase in the number of Buddhist monks in the last 3-4 years. There were hardly any or no monks about 4 years back study-

ing at the university. The practical learning and adaptive atmosphere they receive at the university is what attracts them," said Singh.

Nguyen Van Quoc, 45, from Vietnam was a lecturer of Vietnamese literature until he was in his 30s but it was after a personal shock at his father's demise that he learnt the practices of Buddhism to deal with the loss. "It ultimately guided me

towards meditation, applying Buddhist sutras to daily life, and pursuing a path focused on wisdom, concentration, and peace. I transformed my life 360 degrees. I completed my MA in Buddhist Philosophy from a university in Greater Noida and came to LU for my PhD," said Quoc who is also known as Bhante Thien Duc.

Similarly, Bante Sumiththanda, 29, from Sri Lanka is also

pursuing research in Buddhist Psychology from a university in Sri Lanka. "I am happy to be the first Buddhist monk from Sri Lanka to pursue the course at Lucknow University."

Ho Duc Hien also known as Bhante Minh, 36, from Vietnam said: "I hold an ICCR Scholarship for PhD studies in Buddhist Philosophy. I chose LU because it was close to many sacred Buddhist places," he said.
